MESSAGE FROM THE LIBRARY MANAGER

As always, we are having a very busy summer. Besides the multifaceted program produced by the Children's department, we are offering book groups, movies, discussion groups, computer classes, and informational programs for Adults and Teens as well. This is all possible because of the ongoing generous support of our Friends. I always feel that we are extremely fortunate to have the support we do, but especially in summer when we are able to offer so many wonderful programs in our community.

Another reason we can offer all we do is that so many take the time to volunteer at the library. Because we try to provide volunteer opportunities for the many high school students that ask, we limit our adult volunteers to those with particular skills. For example we have adults volunteering at our Tech and Gadget Lab, our Job Lab, and at our advanced Math and Science tutoring class. When an adult asks about volunteering I ask about skills. We recently had a retired engineer who is interested in helping out with advanced math and science tutoring, and a retired HR manager who is working in Job Lab. We do need more volunteers with tech skills to assist in our Tech Lab. If you are interested I'd love to hear from you.

We also need a person who is skilled at Facebook to help with the Friends' Facebook page. And we are looking for people with accounting or finance backgrounds to help the Friends out as well. Again, if you are interested please let me know.

We have finally scheduled the upgrade of our audio-visual equipment. We are approaching our 5th anniversary in the new library and the original audio visual equipment is no longer up to date. Again thanks to the Friends we are able to vastly improve our equipment and we expect to be able to offer an audio visual experience that is higher quality, reliable and easy to use. Installation is scheduled for early September.

As reported, County Librarian Jean Hofacket retired in April. Recruitment for her position is expected to begin in the Fall. In the meantime, Carmen Martinez, former Oakland Public Library City Librarian, has been hired as Acting County Librarian.

U. S Congressman Eric Swalwell will be at the Library in the evening of August 19th. He'll be joining us to talk about recent job related legislation. We will have a speaker as well presenting a program entitled "Sure fire Job Strategies for people over 50".

Finally, we sadly bid adieu to Jennifer Young, who is leaving us after 9 years to take a promotion with the Pleasanton Library. Jennifer is fabulous and we are really going to miss her. I know she will miss the many friends she has both among the staff and in the Castro Valley community as well.

SUMMER IS IN FULL SWING!!

Summer is in full swing at the Children's Department! While school's getting out and teachers are looking forward to a relaxing summer break, librarians are just getting started. We couldn't provide the amazing programming we offer every summer without our Friends. Special thanks to the Friends of the Castro Valley Library for their generous funding of the Summer Reading Game & programming. This year's game kicked off on June 9th with the theme "Paws to Read." Children of all ages have until August 31st to read (or be read to) and fill in their game boards. Last year's game reached more than 1,700 participants and this year we're on pace to top that number!



We have nearly 100 middle school volunteers to help participants play the Summer Reading Game this summer. These volunteers are critical to providing great service to our customers and we love rewarding them at the end of the summer with a party. Volunteers who have completed a minimum of 8 hours are invited to a pizza party and performance at the library, all thanks to the Friends of the Castro Valley Library.

Castro Valley Library also offers non-stop programming while school is out. Families with kids 0-5 are flocking to the weekly Playtime for stories, crafts, and toys. June and July drew crowds for music (Didgeridoos Down Under, Hipwaders), movies (*Frozen*, *Lego Movie*), and magic (Brian Scott, Zappo the Magician). Audience members took a starring turn in Kenn Adams' Adventure Time Theatre improv extravaganza. Maker Mondays gave budding DIYers a chance to build with Legos, make African beads, and enter the 2nd Annual Egg Drop Device Competition (no winners this year). Our Thursday, Summer Art and Science Series inspired young minds to build bugs, bounce bubbles, and design distant planets. Many Saturdays we headed outside to meet critters of all shapes and sizes with Sulphur Creek Nature Center. In addition, Game Day is every Thursday afternoon.

IT'S TIME TO RENEW!

Memberships in the Friends of the Castro Valley Library organization renew on October 1st of each year. The August issue of the newsletter is snail-mailed to all current members in order to include a mailing envelope, in which you can send us a renewal check. You can also renew your membership in person at the Friends BookStore inside the Castro Valley Library. Membership cards may be picked up at the BookStore or at the August or December book sale (see page 7 for book sale dates). Please allow about 10 days for us to receive and process your payment. You also have the option of including a stamped, self-addressed envelope with your renewal, and we will mail your card to you.

At \$10 per year, an individual membership in the Friends of the Castro Valley Library includes several benefits: \$7 in discounts at the BookStore, a \$2 discount for each of the 3 annual book sales, and admission to the Friday preview night for each of the 3 annual book sales. This is a total of \$13 in discounts, as well as first chance at the wonderful books available at each of our sales. For **\$20 per year**, a family membership includes two cards, which doubles the discount value to \$26! All members receive our quarterly newsletter.

HHhH Reinhard Heydrich by Laurent Binet (2009 fiction; English translation 2012): This is an extraordinary read. I learned for the first time of Operation Anthropoid, a successful 1942 Czechoslovakian WWII resistance exploit initiated from London by exiled President Benes. Binet immerses his reader in a mixture of historical fact and imaginative musing that flows in starts and fits, in 257 chapterless paragraphs. The episodic narrative takes getting used to, but eventually I was carried along. Binet keeps interrupting his facts with whimsical insertions and authorial concerns. The form is highly original, but it enables Binet to fill puzzling gaps and to maintain pace. The substance of the book is the life and attempted assassination of Reinhard Heydrich, the Blonde Beast, the Hangman of Prague, chief German official in Czechoslovakia. Heydrich's career is outlined against the mesmerizing background of what evolved into Hitler's Final Solution. Binet's description of the Babi Yar massacre alone makes the book memorable. Nor can I forget the erasure of Lidice town. And all along, Heydrich lives like a Roman emperor. Nazidom's tribute to him was to name the Final Solution *Aktion Reinhard*. Operation Anthropoid is detailed in all its fragile complexity, involving multiple heroes and heroines, and a traitor. The denouement is spectacular – Thermopylae reenacted in the Church of Saints Cyril and Methodius, seven men withstanding thousands, killing 800. The aftermath is the extermination in reprisal of thousands, including everyone who made contact with the seven parachutists, all fingered by Karel Curda, rewarded with 1,000,000 marks. Unforgettable. (Martin Waldron)

The Invention of Wings – Sue Monk Kidd (2014 Fiction): Sue Monk Kidd's latest novel is a biographical/historical fiction based on the life of Sarah Grimke in Charleston, South Carolina, who, on her 11th birthday, was given Hetty (otherwise known as Handful), a 10-year-old plantation slave, to be her own handmaiden. Sarah doesn't want to own another human being and tries unsuccessfully to give Hetty back to her parents or to free her. Neither solution is possible, and their two lives become intertwined as they both try their wings to freedom, Sarah from the patriarchal, rigid Southern slave-holding society, and Handful from her restrictions as a slave. Told in alternating chapters, the first-person narratives of Sarah and Handful provide stunning revelations of life in the early to mid-19th century in the South. Kidd masterfully interweaves the stores of an abolition-

ist and early feminist and a fictional slave with true historical figures and events. Available as a hardback book, large print, on CD, audiobook, and ebook in the Castro Valley Library. (Carol Lyke)

Legendary Locals of Castro Valley, Hayward, and San Lorenzo – Doris Marciel and the Hayward Area Historical Society (2013 nonfiction): Last year, the library presented a program relative to this book and some of the very interesting information contained within. You have no doubt heard of at least some of the "locals" featured, but if not, you will certainly recognize many of their namesakes: streets, schools, parks, geographical features, and other points of interest. In this book, you will also discover the valuable contributions these individuals have made to our community. Ms. Marciel and the Historical Society have done an outstanding job recounting brief biographies and/or other information regarding well over 100 individuals and organizations. Recommended for local history buffs and those who love our community. (Ginger Russell)

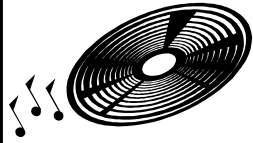
Quiet: The Power of the Introvert in a World That Can't Stop Talking – Susan Cain (2012 nonfiction): Susan Cain's landmark book has been on the bestseller lists for months, and with good reason. It is informatively written and researched (to the point of redundancy in some parts) but explains basic differences between introverts (at least 1/3 of the population) and extroverts – how they approach problems, how they respond in group situations, how they revive themselves to get ready for the next activity. It gives introverts an insight into their personalities and how to use them to best advantage. A valuable section of this book is on parenting introverted children, how to support them and be their advocates. Available as a hardback book in the Library, and also available in large print, on CD, and as an audiobook. (Carol Lyke)

(That's a term of endearment for the black vinyl records which were the standard for music releases before 8-track, cassettes, MDs or CDs ruled the sound waves.) It is a fact that vinyl disk releases are all the rage now, and many of the CD replicators are offering LP and EP products on vinyl again!



The Castro Valley Library BookStore was given a beautiful set of these black disks which play at 33-1/3 RPM (revolutions per minute) on turntables, which were called "record players." These records were called LPs because they were longer playing than the earlier 45's or 78's.

This nearly complete collection of the "Great Men of Music" is in our overflow storage today. We have a 26 volume set of records produced by Time Life. This premium vinyl collection for the discerning audiophile and classical music lover comes in boxed sets, organized by composer. Most of these boxed sets are still in the original shrink wrap, never played before. These sets of 4 records include a pamphlet giving the background on the composer and a listening guide to individual tracks.

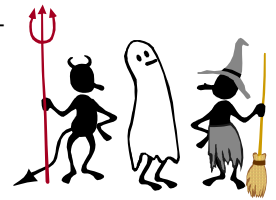

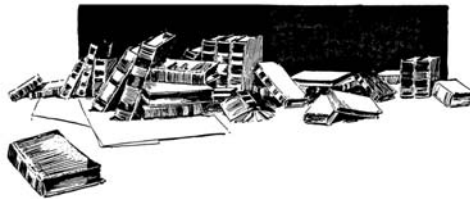
