Every year at this time we remind you to renew your membership in the Friends of the Library. Membership runs from January 1 to December 31. Your continued support helps us fund our library's community programs, including computer classes for adults, special speakers and concerts, wonderful children's programs and much, much more.

In the past we have included renewal forms with this newsletter. This year we will send your renewal information separately. New membership cards will be available on October 31. You can return your renewal by mail in the return envelope we provide, or you can stop by the store and pay for your membership and pick up your new card on or after that date. As always, your membership includes discounts on purchases in our bookstore and at our three times a year book sales.

The final book sale for this year will be December 6 to 8. As always, Friday night will be for members only from six to eight PM. Saturday hours are 10 to 4. And Sunday afternoon is the "Bag Sale," when you can purchase a grocery bag full of books for only \$4! We provide the bags.

As always, please stop by our BookStore when you are looking for a gift or just a book to treasure for yourself. We have a wide variety of quality books, including novels, mysteries, biographies, and non-fiction books on many topics. We have a section of non-English language books that includes novels as well as learning materials and dictionaries. And our children's book section has books for toddlers, school-age children, and teens.

I especially encourage you to take a look at the outer shelf of the bookstore (facing the parking lot), where we have a rotating selection of excellent high quality books.

In closing, I want to invite you to our annual meeting of the Friends of the Library on Wednesday, November 13 at 6:00 PM in the Chabot Room of the library. We will approve the library's Wish List for the coming year and we will be electing a President, Secretary, Operational Treasurer, and two At-Large Directors. Please join us if you can.

MESSAGE FROM THE LIBRARY MANAGER

We recently celebrated our 10th anniversary at the "new" building on Norbridge Ave. On Halloween 2009, so many community members participated in our opening day activities. We passed books from the old library on Redwood Rd to the new location. We called it "The Great Book Pass", and I'm so thankful to have been a part of the community celebration. It's not very often a new library opens. I was an intern at the time and played a role in planning the book pass. I ran up and down Redwood Rd between the two libraries, several times that day. My family was in the crowd passing books as were many friends. There was really something special in the air. Everyone who participated has their memories of opening day. Our 10th anniversary in this building passed without much fanfare, since we enjoyed a big party for our 100th anniversary last year, but I know most of the staff and much of the community are reflecting on how quickly 10 years can pass. Nathan Silva, our Teen Librarian, has been at Castro Valley for more than twelve years, and continues to provide new and relevant programming to our teen members. Mitzi, Andre, Gina, Vicki, and Renee all opened the library in 2009, and continue to keep the library running smoothly. I really enjoy when a member stops by to chat and tells me they were here that day in 2009. It was truly a special day for a much deserving community.

We have grown into our building, and although our circulation has never been as high as it was that first year, the number of people coming to the branch for programming, to study, meet friends or a respite from the weather, continues to grow. Our parking lot seems to get smaller and smaller as the years go by.

In January, we will pay our respects to the late quilter and Castro Valley resident, Marion Coleman, by displaying one of her quilts and offering commemorative bookmarks to our members. Marion's amazing work was recently displayed at the Hayward Historical Society Museum. Please come by and see one of Marion's beautiful and historical quilts during the month of January.

2020 will bring the 3rd Annual Castro Valley Reads. Castro Valley Reads is our community reads event. CONSUMER RESOURCES – BEYOND CONSUMER REPORTS

Many of us routinely consult *Consumer Reports* magazine for reliable, objective ratings when we're shopping for big ticket items such as cars or appliances, and even for inexpensive items such as toasters or blenders. But do you know where to look for reviews when shopping for a new bank, credit union, insurance company, doctor, house painter, or auto body shop? If you're looking at websites like Yelp or Nextdoor, you should know that studies indicate social media reviews are unreliable. So where do you go for reliable, objective ratings? Most people don't even know this is possible, but it is, and it's FREE with your Alameda County Library Card!

Financial Ratings Series: How do you know if your bank or credit union is financially stable? Did you pick the best life insurance company? Can your property insurer cover the losses of a large-scale fire? Are you getting the best deal on your Medigap Insurance? Which mutual fund will give you the best return? Which stocks are the best to choose? These questions and more can be answered by visiting the library's online subscription to **Finance Ratings Series (FRS)**. **FRS** is designed to direct you toward safe banking and insurance options and strong investments while helping you avoid unnecessary risk. You can create your own Personal Profile to build your own Watchlist, get Upgrade/Downgrade Alerts, and log in from anywhere. To use **FRS**, visit the library's website at www.aclibrary.org, click on the **LEARN** tab, and select **eLibrary**. Scroll down to find Financial Rating Series and login with your library card and pin number.

Bay Area Consumers' Checkbook: Published by the Center for the Study of Services, an independent nonprofit consumer organization, **Checkbook** is where to go for objective, reliable ratings of local doctors, dentists, auto repair shops, carpet cleaners, contractors, electricians, roofers, and much more! **Checkbook** surveys consumers and evaluates the quality and prices of local service companies. **Checkbook** is available both in print and online (in-library use only) at the Castro Valley Library Information Desk. Visit, and we'll show you how to use this important resource.

Consumer Reports: Did you know you have FREE access to this important resource with your library card? You do! *Consumer Reports* is available to Alameda County Library card holders through **MasterFile Premier**. To use **MasterFile**, visit the library's website at www.aclibrary.org, click on the **LEARN** tab, and select **eLibrary**. Scroll down to find **MasterFile Premier** and login with your library card and pin number. Type the item you're researching in the search box, followed by the words, "consumer reports." Scroll through the results to locate the most recent article. It couldn't be easier!

DONATION GUIDELINES

The success of the Friends of the Castro Valley Library depends on your generous donations of books, CD's, and DVD's. We are happy to receive your donations any time the BookStore is open. If you have more than a few bags or cartons, please contact us ahead of time, as we may want to make arrangements for your donation to be dropped off at our storage facility rather than at the Library. **Please do not leave donations outside the Library** as they are subject to weather or vandalism damage and detract from the appearance of our beautiful Library.

PLEASE NOTE that we cannot accept donations for a two week period prior to a book sale due to space constraints.

At this time, we are accepting donations of most types of books, DVDs, and music CDs in good, saleable condition, as well as magazines that are no more than 3 months old. We **do not accept** sets of books such as encyclopedias, Time-Life sets, condensed books, textbooks older than 3 years, or books that are dirty, moldy, smoky, or otherwise damaged. We also **cannot accept** VHS tapes (except Disney), vinyl records, or cassette tapes (music or audiobooks).

Funds received from the sale of these items pay for many library programs and amenities that would not otherwise be available.

If you have questions about donating or how the donations are used, please let us know! Donation guidelines are available at the BookStore or on our website.

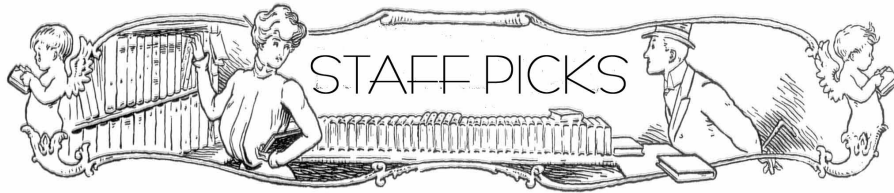

Finding Dorothy by Elizabeth Letts (2019 fiction): Maud Gage Baum was born in 1861, the daughter of Matilda Gage, who was a prominent women’s rights advocate and a contemporary of Susan B. Anthony and Elizabeth Cady Stanton. So it’s no wonder that Maud had a free and enriching childhood and resisted many of the conventions of the time. She was one of the first women to attend Cornell University. When she married L. Frank Baum, an actor and the head of a traveling theater troupe, it was a case of “opposites attract.” This is the story of Maud and Frank’s sometimes troubled but always entertaining marriage, and their struggle to survive over many years until he finally achieved success with his *Wizard of Oz* book series. It is also the story of Maud’s attempts in 1939 to make sure that the movie stayed true to Frank’s book and her relationship with Judy Garland. It is a very entertaining fictional biography of a woman that I would like to have known. What I found particularly interesting and almost magical are the events in Maud’s and Frank’s lives that sparked events and characters in the *Wizard of Oz* books. While this is indeed a novel, the author explains in her Afterword that she took very few liberties in telling Maud’s story. I really enjoyed reading it. Recommended! (Ginger Russell)

Travels with Charley: In Search of America by John Steinbeck (1962 nonfiction): Over 50 years ago, Americans were captivated by John Steinbeck’s road trip around the US with his blue standard poodle, Charley. Does his journey still resonate many decades later? Some of the dirt roads he traveled are now asphalted highways; the people he met are long gone, but others with similar stories, opinions and lifestyles remain in our midst; his eyes and ears, as conveyed



by his descriptive pen, bring nods of recognition. He still is capable of taking us along on his contemplative journey, filled with beauty, insights and humor. *Travels with Charley: In Search of America* by John Steinbeck is a delightful return to yesteryear as we recognize truths that aptly apply today. (Carol Lyke)

The Help by Kathryn Stockett (2009 fiction): This is an unforgettable story, the record of a Southern township’s loosely knit community of black house servants’ experiences in white families. They cooked family meals, cleaned every item and corner, and mothered the children until they reached preschool age. The times were the 1960’s, the burgeoning of civil rights. The story is told by the nannies, organized by Eugenia Phelan, a highly intelligent but socially inadequate and unprepossessing white girl. Their charges bonded with the nannies. The white wives and mothers lived socially pretentious lives, and

their attitude toward the nannies is best illustrated by the *Home Help Sanitation Initiative*: “Every household has to provide separate toilet facilities in the garage or shed for the help, as a disease preventative measure.” The story is a thriller. Eugenia, Miss Skeeter, makes contact with the *New York Times* and is encouraged to write. She slowly makes contact with the nannies, and transcribes their stories, not all bad, all identifying names changed. Their book is published, written by *Anonymous*. The town is reading and recognizing itself. I invite you to read and relish the delicious denouement. (Martin Waldron)

The Long Flight Home by Alan Hlad (2019 fiction): This debut novel by Alan Hlad appears to be yet another novel about World War II and the bombing of Britain, but the story is that of the National Pigeon Service, the civilian group who in another life raised and raced homing pigeons. In 1940, the British military requisitioned the pigeons with the idea that they would be dropped by parachute into occupied France, where they would be picked up by the Resistance and used to transmit messages about Nazi locations and activities. It was expected that most of the pigeons would not survive, but that a few would return to England carrying vital information. Susan Shepherd and her grandfather are members of the NPS, contributing 1,000 of their flock. Due to a set of circumstances, she meets Maine crop duster Oliver Evans, who had hopes of joining the RAF and instead ends up working for the Shepherds and their pigeon enterprise. Duchess is Susan’s pet pigeon who was never meant to be part of the group, but she is accidentally caged and loaded onto the transport plane. While Oliver is attempting to get her back, the plane takes off and both Oliver and Duchess end up on their way to France, where the pigeons are released and the plane is shot down. Oliver is able to attach a message to Duchess and send her home, whereby begins a correspondence between himself and Susan via pigeon. While this is fiction, the basis of the story is true, and another heroic war operation is revealed. I truly enjoyed this book. It is well written and holds your interest until the end. (Ginger Russell)

September 30th was the end of the 2018-2019 fiscal year, and the Board of Directors is pleased to report that our total income increased from the prior year due to higher sales in the BookStore, on-line sales, and special sale events held throughout the year. Additionally, pop-up membership sales were also successful. The funds generated from these sales combined with the three well-attended book sales provided the opportunity to completely fund the Library Wish List. The Board of Directors will be presenting the 2018-2019 Annual Report and the budget for the coming year, as well as the Library Manager's Wish List at the Annual Meeting (see notice above). We anticipate additional funding to the library in the coming year, particularly for the Wish List, which we have been able to increase each of the past several years.
