Our book choices for our 5<sup>th</sup> annual Castro Valley Reads were announced in early January. *Earth Keeper* by N. Scott Momaday, and *Fire in Paradise* by Alastair Gee and Dani Anguiano are the two selections for 2022. We are so pleased to be able to provide the community with another opportunity to come together, read, and discuss the same books. Please consider joining other community members for a book discussion group at the library or in your homes. Tell your neighbors. We'll provide the books!

We have a lot of wonderful programming for CV Reads this year. In February, we have programs to discuss climate concerns in the Bay Area; wildfire, water, and drought programs, and a general climate change program to inform and help you get involved with local groups and solutions. In March we have a virtual Budding Environmentalists Storytime and a tween program for Managing Climate Anxiety. We're also displaying art provided by the Hayward Arts Council and Art Inc. to encourage thought and conversation around climate change and our beautiful planet.

This is our 3<sup>rd</sup> annual Kids Read event. The kids are reading *Paradise on Fire* by Jewell Parker Rhodes. This work of fiction, for ages 9-12, is inspired by the real life Camp Fire.

#### **Castro Valley Reads**

In January, we marked the 5<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Castro Valley Reads! We want to thank the Friends of the Library for their generous and continued support of this community-wide reading program. It is because of you that we have been able to conduct this experiment in connecting community members through great books and engaging discussions.

For 2022, our theme is climate change. Climate change is a politically and emotionally fraught topic. There are daily reports of the consequences of climate change, including fires, floods, species loss, and rising seas. There are also daily reports of innovative solutions, a powerful youth movement, and treaties among hundreds of nations. During the process of preparing for this program, we at Castro Valley Library have felt everything from anxiety and avoidance to hope and determination.

To help meet our readers' interests and moods regarding climate change, we are for the first time offering two books as part of Castro Valley Reads.

One of our books is *Fire in Paradise: An American Tragedy* by Alastair Gee and Dani Anguiano, reporters for *The Guardian*. The book is their dramatic narrative of the 2018 Camp Fire on Paradise Ridge and an unforgettable story of an American town at the forefront of the climate emergency. They bring to life the effects of the fire through intimate portraits of local residents and the landscape, and they give all California residents much to consider as we seek to mitigate risks from wildfire and drought.

The other book is *Earth Keeper: Reflections on the American Land* by N. Scott Momaday, a Pulitzer-prize winning Kiowa poet, novelist, and Native American scholar. In *Earth Keeper*, a book of free-verse poetry, he reflects on his sacred connection to the American landscape and its influence on his people. Momaday shares his reverence for the natural world and calls on all of us to protect the Earth's wonders and beauty.

Our virtual Kick-Off event was Sunday, January 23. We were thrilled do a live interview with N. Scott Momaday via Zoom from his home in New Mexico. Alameda County Youth Poet Laureate and Castro Valley High School student Zoe Dorado and Librarian Chris Selig facilitated the event. A recording will be available on YouTube if you missed it.

Discussion groups are meeting at the library and out in the community through April 4. There are still a few opportunities for you to participate. We are really looking forward to the Grand Finale on Sunday, April 10, at 3 pm. Please join us for a live, online event on Zoom featuring *Fire in Paradise* authors Alastair Gee and Dani Anguiano. They'll share an update on the town of Paradise and discuss the process of writing the book. Don't miss this opportunity to hear from two reporters working at *The Guardian*, one of the premier publications reporting on climate change.

## Book Review

**Sunflower Sisters** by Martha Hall Kelly (2021 fiction):

This is the third and last in the series about the Woolsey family women. (The previous books were *Lilac Girls* and *Lost Roses*.) This novel takes place during the Civil War and tells the stories of 3 women in alternating chapters: Georgeanna Woolsey, a Union Army nurse and activist, Anne-May Watson, a Maryland tobacco plantation owner, and Jemma, her "house slave." Spanning only the years 1861 to 1864, Kelly has packed a lot of history and adventure into her book. The telling is graphic in places and expresses both heroism and cruelty. Based on the written accounts and correspondence of the Woolsey family women, Kelly has crafted an entertaining and informative novel that holds your attention until the end. If you haven't read *Lilac Girls* or *Lost Roses* yet, you don't need to read the books in order, but I do recommend those as well.
