MESSAGE FROM THE LIBRARY MANAGER

As always, I have a few exciting items to report. First of all, after a long period of hiring freezes, we have been able to start hiring staff again. In the next few months look for a number of new faces. Many of you remember Donna Krehbiel, our long-time adult services librarian. Donna retired in March of 2013, and her position has been vacant ever since. In October it was finally filled by Chris Selig. Chris is the former branch manager of the Manor Branch in San Leandro. She also worked at the San Leandro Main Library for 5 years. Please say hi, and welcome her if you get the chance.

The other long-time-coming piece of news is that we were finally able to complete the upgrade of our audio visual system in the Chabot and Canyon rooms. Our equipment was 6 years old and in the AV world, ancient. It was difficult to use and the quality was substandard. Thanks to the support of the Friends we were able to completely redo the system. It is easy to operate, reliable, and the quality is great. When I demonstrated it to acting County Librarian Carmen Martinez and told her the Friends had raised the money to pay for it, she was impressed and told me she thought it was an outstanding example of Friends support.

We also were able to improve the public internet computer experience. New printing equipment was installed, and we extended the time limits in internet use from 60 minutes to 90 minutes per day. On Mondays and Wednesdays, additional time is available for job hunters through Job Lab as well.

In early October, we had a packed house for an event we co-sponsored with the Eden Area League of Women Voters. We hosted the Castro Valley School Board and AC Transit Board candidate debates. They were informative and lively and gave community members a good chance to get a look at the candidates and their positions. We were also a site for a drug take-back event, where the public could safely drop off expired or no longer needed prescription drugs. This is the second time we have been a drop off site, and on both occasions people told me they really appreciated the convenience.

On November 19th at 1:30 p.m. we are happy to be offering a marvelous performance by the Stagebridge theater company called "Never Too Late", a musical review. The performance will feature music, skits and comedy and is sure to be entertaining for all.

And finally, we will once again be working in partnership with Covered California to help people register for health care during the upcoming open enrollment period. Agents will be at the Library and will available to assist with enrollment.

MAKER PROGRAMS COMING UP THIS FALL!!!

We had a wonderful all-staff day at the Castro Valley Library on Friday, October 10th. Hundreds of library staff converged at the library for training and team building.

Our Alameda County Library System includes 10 branches from Albany to Fremont, and a Bookmobile. There are approximately 400 employees in the system, and it was a great opportunity to reacquaint ourselves and in some cases, become acquainted. The Castro Valley branch employs 23 employees total. All staff at-



tended a 2 hour customer service workshop and also a Maker gadget activity program. The Maker movement focuses on hands-on learning in many areas, including electronics, robotics, woodworking and crafts, to name a few. The Maker equipment will be coming to a library near you soon if it hasn't already. Castro Valley unveiled a 3-D printer in October.

3D printing, or additive manufacturing, is a process of making three dimensional solid objects from a digital file. In an additive process an object is created by laying down successive layers of material until the entire object is created. Each of these layers can be seen as a thinly sliced horizontal cross-sections of the eventual object. Our 3 -D printer used strands of plastic to create its objects. Staff has been experimenting and has created bracelets, chess pieces, and a comb.

In addition to 3-D printing, there are many other programs coming, including a Press a Tote Workshop in November. TechShop Staff will be here with their Heat Press station to help you create your own designs and press them into tote bags. (Ages 15 and up). Sewing machines and squishy circuits are some of the other great hands-on programs coming to Castro Valley and all of our other wonderful libraries in the next few months. Drift-The Unmooring of American Military Power by Rachel Maddow (2012 nonfiction): This is an entertaining yet scary book. Rachel Maddow (of CVHS, Stanford, and Oxford) examines various facets of the American Armed Forces, and discovers a monster out of control. She never refers to Eisenhower's military industrial complex warning, but his 1961 warning foreshadowed Drift. The U.S. Army is more powerful than all other world forces combined, and its costs are unchecked and over half that of the rest of the world. The basic Constitutional check of Congress on Presidential executive war making power has been eroded and ignored since Lyndon Johnson. Presidents now act first and consult later. The historic composition of the Army has been altered from that of Jefferson's citizen soldier army to an excessive reliance on National Guard, Reserves, and an unknown degree of privatization. Maddow spares no one and lets the documented facts speak. Reagan and the Grenada fiasco make amusing reading. The never-ending and irrational nuclear shield is described, complete with terrifying mishaps and inept inspections. The scandals, financial and humanitarian, of unsupervised privatization are recalled. She concludes with eight bullets, steps leading to recovering our national inheritance-America as a deliberately peaceable nation. Read and ?????. (Martin Waldron)

Gone Girl by Gillian Flynn (2012 Fiction) and 20th Century Fox/Regency Enterprises production: The Novel: Gillian Flynn's novel is a page-turner, although it isn't one of those books you can read in a weekend. The plot concerns a 30something couple, Nick and Amy Dunne, working through difficulties in their relationship. On their fifth anniversary, Amy disappears and Nick becomes the town whipping boy. Related in alternating chapters by the two protagonists, the story twists and turns until it eventually reaches its conclusion. The Film: Fans of the book will not be disappointed. Gillian Flynn was able to translate her very tense, thrilling novel into a very tense, thrilling screenplay. The cast is excellent, and the plot twists are pretty much all there and just as provocative as they are in the book. I don't want to tell anything else about it, but fans of thrillers and mysteries will love this one. The book and the film are both recommended. (Ginger Russell)

The Truth is a Cave in the Black Mountains by Neil Gaiman (2014 Fiction): The brilliant illustrations and the intermixing of pictures and text make this novel seem like a rich chocolate dessert, one which you take in small bites and slowly savor each one. So rich is the mixture that it quickly draws you into the tale based on a legend from the Isle of Skye. It is only 73 pages long, but you nevertheless are sated by the end. Available in the Castro Valley Library. (Carol Lyke)

Three Stations by Martin Cruz Smith (2010 Fiction): This is one of three recent books by Smith which I have read. The others were *December* 6^{th} and *Stallion Gate*. He conjures up detailed worlds filled with accurately etched characters. The

characters are whirled along inevitable and irresistible plot lines which correspond to real life situations. Moscow in 2010 (Three Stations), Tokyo in 1941 (December 6th), and Los Alamos in 1945 (Stallion Gate) are brought to life and populated with fascinating people, a mixture of historical and fictional. Three Stations is a heart-wrenching story of a stolen baby, born to a child prostitute. Smith's lead protagonist is Arkady Renko, a flawed police detective. The setting is Moscow's version of San Francisco's Tenderloin, an urban jungle filled with vice and evil, and yet redeemed by flashes of love and loyalty. The community of children has unforgettable qualities, reminiscent of Lord of the Flies, but more diverse and hopeful. The adult world is uniquely Russian but compelling, ranging through billionaires, ballet dancers, and thugs. The stolen baby's fate runs parallel to a serial killer, but Renko perseveres, and justice is done. Three Stations is eventually heart-warming rather than wrenching. (Martin Waldron)

The Presidents Club: Inside the World's Most Exclusive Fraternity – Nancy Gibbs and Michael McDuffy (2012 Nonfiction): Although there is no official club, the only way to join this elite group is to be a past president of the United States. Gibbs and McDuffy explore in detail the relationships of past and present presidents, beginning with President Truman who enlisted the aid of Herbert Hoover to coordinate and oversee getting food supplies to 100 million starving Europeans after WWII. It highlights the cooperation, sometimes intrigue and betrayal, of past presidents with the sitting Commander in Chief. There is no party bias in this account and it is endlessly fascinating. A long book (over 650 pages including an extensive bibliography and attributions), it is available from the Castro Valley Library. (Carol Lyke)

Twenty Feet From Stardom – Anchor Bay Entertainment (Documentary, 2013): This film chronicles the careers of several of the music industry's most "invisible" performers, those known as back-up or background singers. Notables include Darlene Love (the Crystals, the Blossoms), Merry Clayton, Lisa Fischer, Claudia Lennear, and Judith Hill; interviews include Bruce Springsteen, Mick Jagger, Stevie Wonder, and Bette Midler. The film includes both present-day interviews and performances and historical footage. Of interest to fans of pop music and music history, as well as those of us who grew up with "the sound," this film is well-documented and photographed. It is available on DVD. (Ginger Russell)

It is a fact that vinyl disk releases are all the rage now, and many of the CD replicators are offering LP and EP products on vinyl again.)

The Castro Valley Library BookStore was given 2 boxes of 33-1/3 RPM LPs, mostly Evergreens, which we are offering at **\$50** for a total of **92 records** (both boxes!). The first box contains 43 miscellaneous albums including Bing Crosby (18!), Perry Como (10), some choice movie soundtracks, and Jimmy and Tommy Dorsey.

The second box is a treasure trove of 49 Original Cast Recordings of the most famous Broadway show tunes. These include: *Fiddler on the Roof*, *How to Succeed in Business*, *Hello Dolly*, *High Spirits*, *High Button Shoes*, *Happy Hunting*, *Gypsy*, *The King and I*, *Kiss Me Kate*, *Kismet*, *Jumbo*, and *Flahoolley* (Yma Sumac!).
