## MESSAGE FROM THE LIBRARY MANAGER

**The start of a new year** is always a good time to look back and look forward. We really had a great 2014 with a huge number of excellent programs and events thanks to the Friends and to the talented Castro Valley staff. The building continues to look great and function well and the Library continues to be a major destination for the Castro Valley community.

**A few highlights that stand out in my mind** include the following. Our solar panels have generated over 1.5 million kilowatts of power. They have completely pow-



ered all electricity in the building since their installation. Our Food for Fines program this year was the most successful ever. Members could reduce their fines by donating food for the Alameda County Food Bank. Close to 2,000 items were donated in Castro Valley. Partnering with the League of Women Voters, we held our first ever Congressional debate. It was the first

time I'd seen quite that many Teamsters in the Library at one time. And finally, with money raised by the Friends, we are able to upgrade our Audio Visual system in the Chabot and Canyon rooms. This has allowed us to expand programming and improve the overall experience for our audiences.

As we begin 2015, there are a few things I'd like to see us achieve. First, I hope we can reopen the café. We expected it to reopen last Fall, but because of a number of job transfers and vacancies in other County Departments, the key people who were needed to make it happen were not there to follow through on plans. I truly hope we can move forward on this, and I am committed to doing my best to get it done. Next, I am hoping that we will be fully staffed in 2015. Because of the recession, hiring had been stalled and as a result we have had vacancies for most of the time we have been in this building. A full staff would really allow us to deliver the level of customer service we strive to achieve. Finally, I am looking forward to a new initiative that will bring laptops and ipads for check out and use in the library. Sometime this year, we will be adding Kiosks that will make this possible. Along with them, we will be adding wireless printing so that members using their own devices will be able to print through the Library's printer.

And finally, for the first time ever, the library will only be offering a limited number of tax forms. We have always been proud to stock a full complement of forms and instructions, but this year the IRS has severely restricted its program and will not be sending libraries most forms and instructions. We know many people depend on us for this program and we are saddened that we will not be able to help them.

## **Castro Valley Library Book Clubs**

**Please consider joining** one of the great book clubs at the Castro Valley Library.

When you join a book club you'll get to know people in your community and be exposed to new books and perspectives. Take it from a librarian, reading provides mental stimulation by expanding your vocabulary, increasing your analytical skills, and improving your focus and concentration. Plus our book clubs are fun!

The Library has four free book clubs to choose from.

If you love a good mystery, join the Mystery Book Club for a lively discussion of classic and current crime fiction. The club is facilitated by best-selling mystery writer, Camille Minichino, a Castro Valley resident, on the **first Tuesday** of each month at 6:30 pm. Drop in or contact Ms. Minichino at <u>camille@minichino.com</u>.

**Our eBestseller Book Club** is for adults interested in getting a taste of reading eBooks on a Library-owned NOOK tablet. Advance registration is required, so come to the Library to sign up and learn about the requirements for participation. This book club is limited to 12 people. Attend the first meeting on February 10<sup>th</sup> to receive your NOOK tablet and learn how to use it. Then on March 10<sup>th</sup>, April 14<sup>th</sup>, and May 14<sup>th</sup> at 6:30 pm the group will meet to discuss a bestselling book preloaded on the NOOKs.

In the Parent-Child Book Club, parents read and discuss the same books as their sons and daughters. The conversations can bring families closer together and foster community with other families. The club meets the **third Tuesday** of every month at 7 pm and is recommended for ages 9 to 12. Stop by the Library to sign up and learn about upcoming dates and titles.

Lastly there's the original Castro Valley Library Book Club for adults who want to read and discuss a wide variety of fiction and nonfiction selected by club members and librarians. This book club meets on the last Tuesday of each month from 6:30 pm to 8 pm. At the next meeting on Tuesday, February 24 we will be discussing *Into the Beautiful North* by Luis Alberto Urrea. Stop by the Library to sign up or just drop in.

Memberships in the Friends of the Castro Valley Library are available for as little as \$10 per year. For this basic level, your membership allows you to attend the member preview night at our tri-annual book sales, obtain a \$2 discount for each book sale (\$6 total for the year), and obtain \$7 in discounts for the BookStore. With a **family membership** (\$20 per year), you receive \$4 in discounts for each book sale and \$14 in discounts for the BookStore. In addition, you will receive this quarterly newsletter, Circle of Friends, by e-mail (or snail mail if you prefer).

Other levels of membership are available: Corporate Sponsor, Benefactor, and Lifetime (individual or family). Your membership dues benefit the Library in the same manner as the monies raised from the sale of donated books-funding many of the programs and amenities that could not otherwise be provided. Application forms can be mailed or dropped off at the BookStore.

## THANK YOU FOR YOUR **GENEROUS DONATIONS!**

The Friends of the Castro Valley Library appreciate your generous donations of books, CDs, DVDs, and other Funds generated from the sale of these items media. pay for many library programs and amenities that could not otherwise be offered.

We generally accept all types of adult and children's fiction and nonfiction books in good condition, except that we cannot accept encyclopedias or other sets of books, condensed books, or textbooks older than 3 years. We also cannot accept books that have gotten damp, moldy, dirty, or smoky. We do accept audio books and other media: however, we can no longer accept VHS tapes other than Disney films. A complete list of donation guidelines is available at the Friends office or on our website.

We also accept magazines. With very few exceptions, magazines should be dated within the past six months. We can accept National Geographics published within the past 3 to 5 years, and can generally accept most older cooking and hobby-related (i.e., woodworking, model building, etc.) magazines as long as the information remains current. Please do not cut the address labels off the magazines; we have a black-out stamp to cover your information. Cutting the covers sometimes causes the covers to tear when placed on our shelves. (Thank you!)

We are excited to report that we have received donations of many wonderful books and other media since the holidays, so please stop by the BookStore and see what we have for you!

Hand in Paw: A Journey of Trust and Discovery by Nancy Schluntz (2014 nonfiction): Nancy Schluntz tells the story of her journey, one we can all relate to: Suffering the pains of growing up; finding family; balancing her spiritual and professional life; and increasing openness to the beauty and power of our natural world. This local author tells her history tenderly, with utter honesty. Nancy became transformed as she slowly began to hear the animals (wild and tame) around her waiting, often impatiently, to communicate with her. You'll laugh aloud at some charming stories of the animals who introduce (nay, sometimes drag) Nancy into her larger world. Their profound messages will help you look at your pets (and the rest of us) with different eyes. With this increased awareness, Nancy folds together her non-profit work career, her evolving family life, her love of nature, and her calling to a ministry of serving animal-human relationships. Watch her understand her challenges and make difficult choices; we've faced many of those life issues ourselves. You will find this wise, moving, and above all merciful story from an accomplished author deeply satisfying. Available currently from the author, The Book Shop, and Amazon. (Alison Lewis)

The Chase by Janet Evanovich (2014) and Destroyer Angel by Nevada Barr (2014) are fun novels. The Chase stops villains with some real and some imagined technology. The hereos are a new set of characters, for Evanovich, a thief and an F.B.I. agent. The pair travels across continents to thwart a vicious criminal with large and deadly staff and access to the latest in technology and some only imagined weapons. Destroyer Angel, also a fun novel to read, is almost the opposite of The Chase. Anna Pigeon, the heroine of this story, has almost no technology to help her save her friends. The five friends include a paraplegic, another mother and each of their teenaged daughters. They are on a wilderness trek that includes some river rafting. Several men have been hired to kidnap two friends and kill the others. Anna must save them all with her wits. (Sara Accornero)

**Palisades Park** - Alan Brennert (2013 Fiction): The author of two other wonderful books, *Moloka'i* and *Honolulu*, this time treats us to an historically accurate snapshot of the beloved Palisades Amusement Park and the saga of a family whose history is intertwined with that of the park. The story begins with Eddie Stopka's 1922 visit to the park and continues through his eventual

employment as a carny, his service in World War II, his marriage, and the birth of his children, one of whom becomes a sideshow high-diver. This is a well-researched novel that chronicles the tough but often exciting lives of the carnies and sideshow acts but also the importance and strength of home and family. Highly recommended. (Ginger Russell)

Philomena (DVD, The Weinstein Company, 2013). Any film with Dame Judith Dench is going to be good, and Philomena is no exception. The title character, Philomena, a young girl in Ireland in the 1950's, gives birth out-of-wedlock to a baby boy. The child is subsequently adopted by an American couple, a devastating event for the young mother. Fifty years later, a chance meeting with journalist Martin Sixsmith (played by Steve Coogan) leads to their search together in Ireland and the US for Philomena's now adult son and for a "human interest" story for Sixsmith. Based on the true story in the book The Lost Child of Philomena Lee by Martin Sixsmith, the film delivers humor, pathos, and an uncanny ability to haunt your thoughts long after the final credits (which include current information about Philomena and Sixsmith) have run. Highly recommended. (Carol Lyke)

Rhythm, Country & Blues (CD, VHS) Copyright 1994 MCA Records, Inc.: About 20 years ago, an outstanding program appeared on PBS which paired prominent R&B artists with prominent Country artists. Some of the participants: Tanya Tucker with Little Richard, Vince Gill with Gladys Knight, Clint Black with the Pointer Sisters, and eight other duets. Rather than showing stage performances, the program was filmed in the recording studio, with all of the typical banter that occurs in that setting. Several years later, I was able to obtain a copy of the VHS recording of the session, and seeing the program twice didn't diminish a bit of its energy. Sometime later, I discovered there is also a CD recording, and while seeing the tape is much better, the recording still manages to convey the really outstanding, apparently unrehearsed music that was created in these sessions. The only thing that would be better is if MCA saw their way clear to putting this on a DVD, which they evidently have not. If you still have a VHS player, or just want to try the CD, both are available on Amazon.com and other media sources. Recommended for fans of both genres. (Ginger Russell)
