PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Annual Meeting: The Friends annual meeting is set for the 8th of November at 6:00 pm. On the docket, in addition to voting for new two-year terms for vice president, co-treasurers, and an at-

large director, are the just-concluded year's fiscal report, approval of the new fiscal year's budget, and a package of proposed amendments of the By-laws. The amendments are to clarify certain sections of the existing document and to bring it into line with the evolution of our mission, officers' responsibilities, and practices that have developed over the past seven years.

A nominating committee has drawn up a slate of candidates for the board positions. These candidates are usually from our group of active book store volunteers but could be any member in good standing. It's a chance to become actively involved in a worthwhile contribution to our community.

Please plan to attend this once-a-year event to meet the directors who spend so much time during the year in keeping the Friends on course in support of the Castro Valley branch. As a dues-paying member, you have a vote at this time in determining our direction. You not only have a vote but are also eligible to make nominations for officers from the floor at the meeting.

Volunteering: A good way to see how it feels is to start as a book sale volunteer as I did. From there you can either limit yourself to book sale setups or move on to become a book store backup volunteer, a regular shift volunteer, or onto board level.

I'm repeating the following from the last newsletter as I don't think it can be said enough.

BookStore Volunteers: As you already know, the Friends BookStore is staffed by volunteers who receive the book, magazine, and multimedia donations, ensure that the material is clean and saleable, sort between Book Store and book sale quality, and sell the merchandise and memberships. These volunteers usually work a set shift each week. Some are in on multiple days. We try to have consistent standards applied by the various volunteers as to operation of the Book Store through our policies and procedures directives. Please let me know if you have any suggestions for improvement.

Membership Information: Often, in the busy times at the Book Store, vital information is missing from the membership forms and thus from our database. This can become an issue at the Members Only Book Sale night. Please help us by ensuring that your membership information is complete when filling out a renewal or new membership form. Thank you.

MESSAGE FROM THE LIBRARY MANAGER

Debate Watch has been fascinating. Thanks to our Friends group, we have been able to stage watch parties for all 4 Presidential Debates. We have started out with a very nice light supper, followed by watching the de-



bates on the big screen, and ending with a moderated discussion lead by the Eden Area League of Women Voters. Everyone has raved about the food and really appreciate the support from our Friends in providing it. Many have told me the experience of watching the debates on the big screen with their

friends and neighbors has been quite different than watching in their homes. A number of people told me that don't have a television and really appreciated the opportunity to see the debates. In this time of harsh rhetoric and political polarity I have appreciated the respect that people have shown for each other, and the opportunity for the Library to bring people together.

We also hosted Eden Area League of Women Voters debates for both the School Board and Sanitary District candidates. And as always we gave out lots of voter registration forms at the Library as well.

Thanks to the Friends, we were able to purchase a *Prowise* screen for the Learning Center. This 84" screen is large enough to be seen from the back as well as the front of the room. It has a built in computer and is easy for our instructors to use. It is a much better experience for our computer classes and should have additional uses as well. The other building improvement we were able to put in place, thanks to the Friends, was adding spot lights to the third section of mural in the Children's area of the Library. When the mural was originally commissioned the third section was not included, but was added at a later date. Unfortunately spot lights were not planned for or installed as a result. We added them in October—stop by and take a look—the very nice third section really pops now.

We have a very special program planned for November 12 at the Library. San Francisco Chronicle film critic Mick LaSalle will be here to talk about "Hollywood before Censorship". During the early 1930s films were not subject to the Motion Picture Production Code. Mick LaSalle has written two books on film during this time period. After his talk we will be showing one of the best known films from the era, "Baby Face". It should be great fun.

Again in December, we will be hosting a variety of Holiday Concerts. Swinging Holidays with Milt Bowerman is scheduled for December 11th. The Hillside Wood Quintet and the Montecito Brass Ensemble will perform on December 17th. And finally we will finish up with our Hanukkah concert on December 27th. We have a holiday card making event scheduled for December 3rd as well. We hope you can join us for these festive programs.

AUTUMN UPDATES

Just as surely as the temperature gradually cools, leaves change color and drift down from the trees, early rains arrive and the creek refills, the fall season brings a change of pace to the library. In the children's area, the click-click-click of the summer reading game wheel is gone and mornings and early afternoons are typically quiet again with children back at school. (Other than days when we offer welcome local classes for a tour!) After school, both the children's and teen rooms are bustling with students of all ages. The Homework Center is up and running again, with an adult aide and teenage volunteers coming back to help younger kids learn.

October special events at the library included televised presidential debates followed by thoughtful discussions moderated by the League of Women voters. Thank you, Friends, for the appetizer spread you provided at these dinnertime events; it was much appreciated by all. Thanks also to librarian Chris Selig, who organized the debatewatch logistics.

This month, children's librarian Dawn Balestreri brings "Dinovember" back to the children's room, which last year featured a hunt for hidden dinosaurs and prizes for little ones who found them among the stacks. This year we'll build on the theme with STEAM programs (crafts that incorporate science, art and math concepts) and a storytime to get kids thinking and learning about dinosaurs and prehistoric times.

On Saturday, November 12, librarian Chris Selig presents a special event on the theme "Hollywood Before Censorship." San Francisco *Chronicle* film critic Mick LaSalle, who has written books on the topic, will speak before a showing of the Pre-Code film *Baby Face*.

The library recently acquired a large-screen *Prowise* touch-screen computer/projector/media player that brings with it new presentation and programming opportunities. The high-tech station will be kept in the Learning Center, where many of our classes and gatherings for adults take place. A genealogy group that meets here was among the first to try out the new technology and gave it a big thumbs -up. Library staff will receive training on the software that drives the Prowise and explore other ways it can be used. Alameda County branches throughout the county will be experimenting and sharing success stories.

November Holidays

Veteran's Day is on Friday, November 11. Schools will be closed (as will the library, as it always is on Fridays). The library will also be closed on Thanksgiving (and closing at 5pm on Thanksgiving Eve). Our staff will be enjoying the day with family and friends, perhaps enjoying a holiday feast or getting outdoors to feel the crisp autumn air and look at the colorful autumn landscape. The success of the Friends of the Castro Valley Library depends on your generous donations of books, CD's, and DVD's. We are happy to receive your donations any time the BookStore is open. If you have a large donation (more than a few cartons) please contact us ahead of time, as we may want to make arrangements for your donation to be dropped off at our storage facility rather than at the Library. Please do not leave donations outside the Library as they are subject to weather or vandalism damage and detract from the appearance of our beautiful Library.

At this time, we are accepting donations of most types of books, DVD's, and music CD's in good, saleable condition. We *do not* accept sets of books such as encyclopedias, Time-Life sets, condensed books, textbooks older than 3 years, or books that are dirty, moldy, smoky, or otherwise damaged. We also cannot accept VHS tapes (except Disney), vinyl records, or cassette tapes (music or audiobooks).

We will gladly accept magazines that are no older than 6 months. Unfortunately, most magazines that are not current will not sell.

Books and other media that are in the best condition are offered for sale in the Friends' BookStore. Most other donations are kept in storage for our three annual big book sales. We may also donate books to other organizations such as the jails, educational facilities, or St. Vincent DePaul. Books that are in poor condition or are otherwise unsaleable will be recycled.

Radio Girls by Sarah-Jane Stratford (2016 fiction): Canadian-American Maisie Musgrave is thrilled to land a job as secretary at the brand-new BBC in 1926. Despite the challenges of a brand-new industry, fast pace, and demanding staff, Maisie eventually discovers an affinity for the work and becomes an assistant and then a producer for the popular "Talks" programming under the tutelage of director Hilda Matheson. Along the way, Maisie unearths a shocking conspiracy, and she and Hilda face the dangerous consequences of telling the truth for a living. Although this is a work of fiction, and Maisie Musgrave is not a real person, this book contains a great deal of history, and many of its characters are real: Hilda Matheson, director of "Talks," John Reith, the director-general, Mary Somerville, who was another BBC director, Lady Astor, and a collection of wellknown figures. The late 1920's and early 1930's were a time of great change in Britain, when women were finally allowed to vote, and the great storm of Fascism was sweeping across Europe. This is a fascinating and welltold tale. Recommended. (Ginger Russell)

Inside of a Dog by Alexandra Horowitz (2009 nonfiction): If you love a dog or have loved a dog or just want to understand dogs better, this book will be an informative and entertaining read. Subtitled "What Dogs See, Smell and Know", the author (a cognitive scientist) mix-

es observations of dog behavior – frequently those of her own dog – with the likely scientific reason behind it. The tone of the book is frequently humorous. (How can it not be; it's about dog behavior!) But the science is serious, describing the studies that produced the cited results. The author clearly loves dogs and the personality of her dog Pumpernickel permeates

the book. The derivation of the title (from Groucho Marx) and the cover photos add to the pleasure of reading this book. (Stephanie Dorward)

The Madonnas of Leningrad by Debra Dean (2006 fiction): My sister-in-law's grandparents were awarded medals for their bravery in sneaking out at night across the frozen river for potatoes during the 1941-42 siege of Leningrad. I have myself wandered through the Hermitage, Leningrad's unsurpassed art gallery. And I recognize the Alzheimer's tsunami scattering my contemporaries' minds – don't ask for details! Debra Dean has interwoven these three themes in this mesmerizing book. The horrors of the siege are conveyed through the experiences of the gallery staff, storing paintings and people in the nethermost basement to avoid nightly German bombing. There isn't enough food. There is no water supply – only thawed ice. There is no heating. There

are no medicines. And the galleries are artless, adorned with empty frames. Marina, main protagonist and eventual Alzheimer's victim, survives by reinstalling in their vacant places the Madonna paintings. She walks the arcades, forcing her imagination to visualize each painting in every detail: Velazquez, Gainsborough, Fragonard, Caraffe, Giorgione, Spada, Caracci, diLorenzo, Martini, daVinci, Rembrandt, Raphael, Rubens, Titian, vanDyke, Caravaggio, Murillo, Zurbaran. Dean intersperses the Hermitage episodes with Marina's granddaughter's American wedding two generations later. Marina's Alzheimer's provides heartbreaking recollections and connections. Her distant past is preserved. Leningrad moments appear. Her present existence is shattered into totally independent experiences. I found The Madonnas of Leningrad sobering, enriching, rewarding. (Martin Waldron)

The Art of Racing in the Rain by Garth Stein (2009 fiction): At first I disdained the thought of novels told through a dog's voice, but many friends had enthusiastically recommended *The Art of Racing in the Rain* by Garth Stein so I was willing to give it a try. On the cover Sara Gruen (*Water for Elephants*) says "This old soul of a dog has much to teach us about being human." Besides that, there is much to teach (some of us) about race car driving as well. Excellently crafted and at times laugh-

> out-loud funny, this novel is about relationships, loyalty, love and hope as seen through the eyes of the "old soul" retrieverterrier mix, Enzo. From there I delved into two other books "written" by dogs, *A Dog's Purpose* and *A Dog's Journey* by Bruce Cameron. Again wise books in which the dogs have the inherited memories of their previous lives and as such can be-

come old souls too as they strive to find and fulfill their purpose in life. (Dogs have a purpose; cats just sit around and are useless according to Dog wisdom.) Whether you're a dog lover or not, the insights into dog thought processes and understandings give one pause (paws?) for thought. All of these books are available in the Castro Valley library in formats including e-books and large print. (Carol Lyke)

2005. Prior to the opening of the new library, Ned was a book sorter, storage guru and book sale leader. In 2008, Ned became Chair of the Transition Committee to direct the Friends move to the new library and establishment of the BookStore. He then was President of


the Friends from 2009 – 2013 during which time he orchestrated with many other volunteers numerous changes in the Friends operations. Ned has served as Chair of the weekend book sales more than 25 times, continues as storage organizer, is the PIC for Science, Sports and Textbooks, has moved thousands of boxes of books over the years, and continues to do many other things too numerous to count or remember.

Ned and his lovely wife Carol ("Team Lyke") have lived in Castro Valley since late 1970. Prior to then they lived in Hayward and Madison, Wisconsin where they met at the University of Wisconsin.

Ned was a Professor of Biological Sciences at Cal-State Hayward/East Bay for 35 years, where he specialized in Invertebrate Zoology, Marine Biology and Science Education programs. Over the years, he held many leadership positions in the department, school, and university as well as at Moss Landing Marine Laboratories.

He was instrumental in establishing and serves as Chair of the Friends of the Libraries of Alameda County, was a long-time Chair of the Citizen's Advisory Committee to the Hayward Shoreline Planning Agency, and is currently also on the Board of the Emeritus Faculty Association of Cal-State, and on the Board of the Bay Area Funeral Consumers Association. When he finds time for other things he enjoys wood turning, gardening, bird-watching, entertaining friends, hiking, camping and trips to other parts of the world with Carol.
