All who attended the Kick-Off Event January 21 and signed up for a discussion group received a free copy of the book and may have an opportunity to meet the author, thanks to funding supplied by the Friends of the Castro Valley Library. Another new program that we support is Bookleggers, a group of trained volunteers who visit elementary classrooms throughout Castro Valley to promote reading and to encourage students to visit the library. Several Friends members and volunteers (myself included) are active Bookleggers, and we are thoroughly enjoying our experience. A second group of Bookleggers will be trained this year. MESSAGE FROM THE LIBRARY MANAGER

I know it's already February, and 2017 seems far away, but I didn't have the opportunity to reflect on all the amazing programming we did last year. Many of us have already bid adieu to our resolutions, but the library has great plans for 2018 and we will follow through. Naturally, our Friends are a major part of our success and give us the ability to follow through with their generous funding. They are truly the frosting on this amazing library.

Thanks to the Friends, we had programming for children all through the winter break in 2017. We have been able to continue offering our children's STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Math) workshops every other Saturday. One of our most popular and highest attending programs, Musical Storytime, was a regular program on Thursday mornings. Mick La Salle discussed the Academy Awards and French actresses. We offered (and continue to offer) free computer and yoga classes, free movies and music (incidentally, all our programming is FREE!). Summer reading games, programming nearly every day during the summer, and great prizes for all ages. Petting zoos and parades at the library too. We even had the Great American Eclipse here at the Castro Valley Library and waited with hundreds of community members for the sun to show itself (it finally did. but barely).

We rolled out our fantastic Castro Valley Booklegger program in 2017, and our 11 volunteers gave 125 book talks in 26 classrooms at 7 Castro Valley elementary schools. These talks are exciting and encouraging children to read; we've seen many of them back in the library looking for the books. Our Bookleggers are getting noticed in the community too, practically superstars to the kids!

We also began planning and announced our book choice for our first annual Castro Valley Reads event. We are so pleased to be able to provide the community with an opportunity to come together, read and discuss the same book. Please consider joining other community members for a book discussion group at the library or in your homes. We'll provide the books! We joined the Castro Valley Community Alliance and will provide a community gathering place for a series of social justice films and panel discussions beginning January 14. We also offered fine forgiveness for two weeks in June. All you had to do was come in and ask. Finally (although not nearly all) we were able to provide 200 new books and prizes to the Ashland Community Center for their annual holiday party for low income youth in the unincorporated area. I could go on and on, or you could stop in and see us this year! It's not too late to make a resolution, and I suggest spending more time with your community at your library.

New Library Program Celebrates Reading and Community Discussion

The Castro Valley Library is pleased to announce the first annual Castro Valley Reads! So far the interest has been robust and we are excited to be able to offer this program to the community.



Following the lead of successful city-wide read programs from across the country, Castro Valley Reads seeks to get as many people as possible to read and discuss the same book to celebrate reading, great literature, and to build community through a thoughtful exchange of ideas.

The 2018 book selection is *Lab Girl* by acclaimed scientist Hope Jahren. Starting from the broad

goal of choosing a book about science and the environment, we were delighted to find this best-selling memoir. Lab Girl is the witty and moving coming-of-age story of an American geobiologist. Jahren has spent her life studying plants, seeds and soil to learn about our environment both past and present. She's a fierce advocate for funding of scientific research and wants all of us to be good stewards of the green things on this earth. This book is also about her life, the ups and downs she's experienced on her journey to becoming an award-winning scientist, and her quirky friendship with her lab partner Bill.

Jahren is the winner of many prestigious awards, including three Fulbright Awards, and is the only woman to have won both Young Investigator Medals given within the earth sciences. After she finished graduate school at UC Berkeley, she built four labs from scratch including the one she now leads in Norway. Her book was called one of the best books of 2016 by *The Washington Post, The New York Times*, NPR, *Slate, Time*, and *Entertainment Weekly*. She is a great writer who is serious about her work, open about her life, all while employing a wicked sense of humor.

The library is offering a wide range of programs around CV Reads. Programming begins in January, ends in April and will include discussion groups, four different opportunities to meet a scientist, art programs, films and even a nature walk at Lake Chabot. There's truly something for every age group and we hope to see the community come out for the programming.

Castro Valley Reads is generously funded by the Friends of the Castro Valley Library.

At this time, we are accepting donations of most types of books, DVDs, and music CDs in good, saleable condition, as well as magazines that are no more than 6 months old. We do not accept sets of books such as encyclopedias, Time-Life sets, condensed books, textbooks older than 3 years, or books that are dirty, moldy, smoky, or otherwise damaged. We also cannot accept VHS tapes (except Disney), vinyl records, or cassette tapes (music or audiobooks).

Funds received from the sale of these items pay for library programs and amenities that would not otherwise be available.

TAX HELP AVAILABLE

The AARP tax preparation service is available again this year at the Castro Valley Library. Appointments are available on Wednesdays and Thursdays from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

You must bring the following items to your appointment:

- A photo ID and Social Security Cards or other official documentation for yourself and your dependents.
- A copy of last year's tax returns.
- All 2017 tax documents, including W-2, 1099, and any other forms.
- Child care provider information (name, employer ID, SSN.
- Records of any estimated tax payments made during 2017.
- A summary of receipts or checks for deductible items (if itemizing).

There is no charge for this service, but you must have an appointment. Please call the Library at 510-667-7900 to reserve your time. Appointment slots fill up fast.

The Snowman by Jo Nesbo (2010 fiction): This is the most infuriating thriller I have ever read. I am an experienced devotee of detective stories, and I am usually able to accompany the plot line to a satisfying conclusion. Not here. I thought I had the solution in my sights on at least three occasions, but I hadn't. Nesbo led me up garden paths, and then abandoned me, exposing me to unsuspected but convincing depths of character and plot development. The characters, located in various stages of relationship to Inspector Harry Hole, are compelling. The locations are cinematic in detail and design. The story line is ghoulish, Grand Guignol, either hypnotic or disgusting. Details are accurate and attest to a Hieronymus Bosch view of the human condition. I recommend The Snowman for a most challenging read, and as an introduction to an incomparable author. (Martin Waldron)

The Alice Network by Kate Quinn (2017 fiction): In post-war 1947, pregnant American college student Charlie St. Clair is sent to Europe to have her "little problem" taken care of. Her beloved cousin Rose disappeared in Nazi-occupied France during the war, and, harboring a faint hope that Rose can be found alive, Charlie obtains the name of Eve Gardiner as someone who might be able to help. Leaving her mother at their hotel, Charlie takes off for London, finds the crusty and reluctant Eve Gardiner and her ex-convict man of work, and the three set off on an adventure to France to look for Rose. In flashbacks to 1915, we learn Eve's story as an English spy during World War I and her courageous work with a female spy group, The Alice Network. The two stories merge when it appears that the same French collaborator who helped the Germans in World War I and the Nazis in World War II may be involved not only in Eve's past but also in Rose's disappearance. By turns funny and suspenseful, this story is made all the more incredible because it is based on the true stories of female operatives in World War I. This is one of those books that I wished would go on a bit longer. Recommended. (Ginger Russell)

Camino Island by John Grisham (2017 fiction): This is a tightly choreographed thriller. John Grisham leads his readers step by step through an interesting tale of original F. Scott Fitzgerald manuscripts. The story is straightforward, involving a cast of credible characters, plenty of good meals and liquor, engaging conversation, mildly titillating sex, and minimal physical violence. I was disappointed in the inevitable unfolding of the plot. Having recently rated Jo Nesbo's The Snowman as infuriating and challenging, I found Camino Island pleasantly soporific. (Martin Waldron)

Imperfect Harmony: Finding Happiness Singing with Others by Stacy Horn (2013 nonfiction): Whether you have been or are part of a chorus, choir, or group singalong, have played a musical instrument with a group, or just enjoy listening to performances of classical music, this is a book waiting for your discovery. Stacy Horn writes of her 30 years singing with the Choral Society of Grace Church in New York City and the complete joy and at times healing - that accompanies being a part of an amateur singing group with its soaring fortissimo exuberance and pianissimo dulce conclusions. Interspersed in her autobiography are lengthy sidebars of biographical backgrounds of composers, the evolution of tones and rhythms over centuries from a few chanting monks to large choirs, and even the neurological science behind how music affects the brain, not only of the performer but the listener as well. Horn, by her own admission, is not a gifted singer, but she writes with wit, enthusiasm, and candor about the joy that comes from being a part of something larger than self, of being in harmony with fellow singers, history, and the music of all ages. Available in the Castro Valley Library. Highly recommended. (Carol Lyke)

Flight Patterns by Karen White (2016 fiction): Georgia Chambers enjoys a career as an antique appraiser and expert in fine china in New Orleans after leaving her home in Apalachicola, Florida, due to a guarrel with her family. When a client appears with a request to evaluate a set of Limoges, she feels she has seen the pattern before at her home. Despite her estrangement from her family, she feels she must visit them in order to determine whether the china is a custom pattern or if additional sets exist. The provenance of the china is not the only mystery to unravel. Georgia's mother has not spoken for several years, and her grandfather hides a crime that was committed 70 years ago. In researching the bee-patterned china, Georgia discovers a link between her family and that of her client. And there is the set of circumstances that caused her to leave home ten years ago. Karen White is a master of novels that involve both convoluted mysteries and family relationships. This one is no exception, and it is a page-turner with surprises in every chapter. Recommended. (Ginger Russell)



To be concluded: The magazine which published *The Old Curiosity Shop* came to America by sailing vessel. As interest in Dickens' story mounted from week to week, the crowds became larger on the New York wharf waiting to buy copies as soon as the boat docked. By the time the story reached its last chapter, these crowds had grown to such numbers and to such a pitch of suspense that they swarmed, five or six thousand strong, upon the wharf and could not wait until the ship docked. When they spied the captain on the deck, they called out across the narrowing water the question that burned in everyone's heart: "Did Little Nell die?"

The above was featured in the May, 1939, issue of the *Reader's Digest*. Interesting to note—there were NO ads in the magazine at that time. You could purchase a year's subscription for \$3.00, or two years for \$5.00.
