Happy February to all of you! The library is off to a great year. Our book choice has been announced for the 2nd annual Castro Valley Reads event. We are so pleased to be able to provide the community with an opportunity to come together, read and discuss the same book. Please consider joining other community members for a book discussion group at the library or in your homes. We'll provide the books! Some of my favorite programs around the event are the film screening of Human Flow by the Artist. Activist and Filmmaker Ai Weiwei on Sunday, March 17. Human Flow captures a year of displacement and urgent human stories in 23 countries around the world due to war, climate change, famine and more. Another favorite is the program "Words

and Color: Postcards from Your Past" where participants will create a beautiful piece of frameable or mail-able art at this writing and art workshop on Sundays, February 17 or March 24. We are also in our 2nd year of participating in the Castro Valley Community Alliance. The next film will be The Resettled about lives of refugees admitted to the U.S., after the film, a panel of high school students will share their stories of growing up as immigrants in our community on Sunday, March 10. This also ties in with Castro Valley Reads. Come into the branch or go online for the event program.

Maybe you have noticed all the above programming is on Sunday. This past year, we have been able to place permanent staff in the library on Sundays (in the past more temporary staff had been assigned). This has allowed us to provide more meaningful and regular programming on Sundays.

One of the most recent changes I'm really excited about is our digitization of the Castro Valley Forum newspaper. Phase I of the project has been completed and phase II is underway. Soon, the community will have the opportunity to peruse more than 30 years of the Forum online. More information coming.

Of course, the Friends have played a primary role in providing funding for most of the events this year. As usual, this library wouldn't be the vibrant community gathering place without the funding of our Friends. Thank you for continuing to support their efforts.

I hope your year is going as well as ours is, and I hope to see you at the library!

CASTRO VALLEY READS 2019 Let's make it bigger and better! By Chris Selig, Librarian II

Castro Valley Reads is back! Castro Valley Reads seeks to get hundreds of community members to read and discuss the same book. With this program, we celebrate reading and great literature, and we build community through a thoughtful exchange of ideas. Once again, the program is generously funded by the Friends of the Library!

"Our first Castro Valley Reads in 2018 was a great success with more than 400 participants," said Dawn Balestreri, branch manager. "We hope you'll join us to grow the program in 2019. What can we learn from each other? What can we learn together? Let's find out!"

This year's theme is immigration. A loud and fractious debate about immigrants and refugees has gripped the country recently. Against this backdrop, the Library proposes that we have a quiet, thoughtful conversation about the experiences of immigrants and refugees. Let's also learn about each other's backgrounds, celebrate the diversity of our community, and build connections.

Our springboard is the intercontinental refugee and immigration story A Backpack, A Bear, and Eight Crates of Vodka by Lev Golinkin. In the twilight of the Cold War, nineyear-old Lev Golinkin and his family cross the Soviet border with only ten suitcases, six hundred dollars, and the vague promise of help waiting in Vienna. Years later, Lev, now an American, sets out to retrace his family's long trek to locate and thank the strangers who fought for his freedom.

Golinkin's memoir is a thrilling tale of escape and survival and a deeply personal look at the life of a Jewish child caught in the last gasp of the Soviet Union. Written with acerbic wit and emotional honesty, Golinkin's story speaks of overcoming the power of hatred and searching for acceptance and belonging.

Golinkin, a graduate of Boston College, came to the US as a child refugee from the eastern Ukrainian city of Kharkov (now called Kharkiv) in 1990. His op-eds and essays have appeared in Foreign Policy, The New York Times, Los Angeles Times, The Boston Globe, and Forward, among others. His essay "Guests of the Holy Roman Empress Maria Theresa" recently appeared in The Displaced: Refugee Writers on Refugee Lives edited by Viet Thanh Nguyen.

The Library is offering a wide range of programs and discussion groups for Castro Valley Reads. Visit the Library today to sign up and get a free copy of the book while supplies last. Attendees of discussion groups will get an invitation to meet Golinkin on Sunday, April 14 at the Castro Valley Center for the Arts.

We're also excited to announce an expansion of the program with the selection of a book on the same theme for kids in grades 4 to 7. Front Desk by local author Kelly Yang is a work of fiction that explores the lives of a family of Chinese immigrants from the perspective of daughter Mia. Kids can register for their own special version of Castro Valley Reads beginning March 1.

If you have a large donation (more than a few cartons) please contact us ahead of time, as we may want to make arrangements for your donation to be dropped off at our storage facility rather than at the Library. Please do not leave donations outside the



Library as they are subject to weather or vandalism damage and detract from the appearance of our beautiful Library.

PLEASE NOTE that we cannot accept donations the week prior to a book sale due to space constraints.

At this time, we are accepting donations of most types of books, DVDs, and music CDs in good, saleable condition, as well as magazines that are no more than 3 months old. We *do not* accept sets of books such as encyclopedias, Time-Life sets, condensed books, textbooks older than 3 years, or books that are dirty, moldy, smoky, or otherwise damaged. We also cannot accept VHS tapes (except Disney), vinyl records, or cassette tapes (music or audiobooks).

Funds received from the sale of these items pay for library programs and amenities that would not otherwise be available.

If you have questions about donating or how the donations are used, please let us know! Donation guidelines are available at the BookStore or on our website. **DID YOU RENEW?** The renewal date for 2019 Friends memberships was January 1st. If you have not renewed your membership yet, this is just a reminder that your \$10 basic membership includes \$13 in discounts for the BookStore and book sales. To renew, drop by the BookStore any time we are open, or you may mail your application form (below) to the Castro Valley Library with your check. Include a stamped, selfaddressed envelope if you want your membership card mailed to you. Membership dues help pay for library programs and amenities that would not otherwise be available. 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Broken Harbor by Tana French (2012 fiction): Tana French has garnered superlative praise for her police procedural thrillers. Broken Harbor is one of five, unforgettable and brilliant. The Spain family is introduced and then, dead or alive, expanded and developed. The plot surges tidally, sustained by extraordinarily convincing dialogue between police operatives, family members, nosy neighbors, and significant others such as the post mortem pathologist, computer experts and internet habitués. French lets the conversations limn the plot. Mental illness is presented, not only in the Spains, but also in Chief Detective Kennedy's family, with his sister Dina's unpredictable and uncontrollable craziness, his mother's ancient suicide, and his dad's heart-breakingly simple Alzheimer's. Ireland's economic recession is a pathetic backdrop as the Spain family is slowly eaten alive. The oxymoronic title tells all. A harbor is a haven. Broken, it betrays, abandons. The promised community, Brianstown, is destroyed. The hope implied in its original Irish breacadh, or day-



break, is never delivered. I found *Broken Harbor* harrowing. The only character achieving a measure of satisfaction is Cooper, the obnoxious pathologist. In the Woods, The Likeness, Faithful Place, and The Secret Place are French's other four novels. (Martin Waldron)

The Clockmaker's Daughter

by Kate Morton (2018 fiction): I'm a big fan of Kate Morton's books and wait eagerly for each new one. As with her other novels, this is a "time slip" book, which flips back and forth through time periods to tell the story. Elodie Winslow is an archivist for a philanthropic endowment, and upon finding an old leather satchel and a mysterious photograph, embarks on a quest for information about an old house that she thought was only a fairy tale. The house is, in fact, real, and at one time belonged to a famous artist with a scandal in his history, as his fiancée was killed in a robbery, with his mistress and a valuable family jewel disappearing in its wake. As the story unfolds, Elodie discovers that her own family is involved in the house's mysterious history. While there are a lot of characters to keep straight and the time slips can seem a bit confusing, the book proceeds to an astonishing conclusion. Not to be missed! (Ginger Russell)

Faceless Killers (the first Kurt Wallander Mystery) by Henning Mankell (2003 fiction): An awful double murder lands at the feet of Wallander. Mankell supplies details of the crime in ever-deepening circles while restricting geographical boundaries and personal relationships. He even provides a helpful local map, and details of Wallander's tortured family - father, sister, estranged wife and daughter - to help the reader experience the slow unravelling of the chase. I was fascinated by the plausible plot, inching along in spite of Wallander's ill health and self-destructive drinking. Wallander ponders hints and traces and clues, revisits and revives ancient relationships. The focal crime has wide anti-immigrant effects, including a second murder and political pressures. I found myself carried along, sharing Wallander's occasional lapses and unexpected bursts of frenetic activity, grateful for positive surprises like a bank teller's memory and colleagues' understanding. This is as satisfying a thriller as I have read. Violence is brutal but shortlived. Characters are complicated but convincing. Life histories are intriguing. Swedish women are not what they seem. Police community life and Wallander are authentic and beckon the reader to return for more. (Martin Waldron)

The Trust by Ronald H. Balson (2017 fiction): Estranged from his family in Northern Ireland 16 years ago, Private Investigator Liam Taggert receives a phone call asking him to return for his uncle's funeral. Upon arriving, he discovers (1) that the death was no accident, and (2) that he has been designated trustee for his uncle's trust. The terms of the trust provide that its provisions remain secret until his uncle's killer has been identified and brought to justice. While he would have preferred to decline the duty and return to his wife and child in Chicago, Liam feels bound to follow his family's wishes and try to determine who killed Uncle Fergus. Was this revenge from a 40-year-old feud from the time of the Irish Troubles? Was it one of the beneficiaries of the trust? All Liam knows is that all of a sudden the other family members begin receiving death threats, including his wife in Chicago, and so he begins his quest. This is a detailed and well-written mystery that includes a great deal of this history of the Troubles as well as the convoluted investigation itself. While many theories are presented, the reader doesn't find out who is behind the murders and threats until the exciting climax. Recommended. (Ginger Russell)

February: Library lover's (month, Groundhog Day; St. Valentine's Day; Black History Month.




March: Celebrate St. Patrick's Day, March into Literacy, study Women's History, create a Craft.
