Our book choice for our 7th annual Castro Valley Reads was announced in early January. *Cold Millions* by Jess Walter is our selection for 2024. We are so pleased to be able to provide the community with another opportunity to come together, read and discuss the same book. Please consider joining other community members for a book discussion group at the library or in your homes. Tell your neighbors. We'll provide the books!

We have a lot of wonderful programming for CV Reads this year. In mid-February, we will welcome the Wobblies for a program on the IWW (Industrial Workers of the World). The San Francisco Bay Area General Membership Branch will discuss the current activity and the importance of labor unions. Late March we'll host Professor Jane Wolford for a presentation on Women in the Labor Movement. We have also invited labor lawyer, Bill Sokol to help us understand income inequality and why it continues to persist and impact the well-being of so many Americans.

In April, we will invite the New York Times bestselling author, Jess Walter, to discuss *Cold Millions* in person. We are very excited to have our author in person for the first time since 2019. Join us at the Castro Valley Performing Arts Center for a lively discussion about our 2024 Community Reads pick. Your free book (while supplies last) and program guide will be available at the library anytime beginning February 4 during or after our kick-off event (see Chris Selig's column for more information).

This is also our 5th annual Tweens Read event. The tweens are reading *Thirst* by Varsha Bajaj, "The riveting story of a heroic girl who fights for her belief that water should be for everyone" and a New York Times Bestseller! Tweens will have the option between two discussion groups to discuss the selection.

Of course, the Friends have played a primary role in providing funding for most of the events this year. As usual, this library wouldn't be a vibrant community gathering place without the funding of our Friends. Thank you for continuing to support their efforts and consider volunteering if you are able.



Castro Valley Reads 2024

We will celebrate our 7th Castro Valley Reads in 2024! This annual literary event, which asks our residents to read and discuss the same book, is generously funded by the Friends of the Castro Valley Library. "Castro Valley Reads is an opportunity to discuss thoughtful books. But more than that,



it is an invitation to come together as a community to grow in our understanding of important ideas and events," said Dawn Balestreri, Manager of the Castro Valley Library. "Nearly 1,000 community members have accepted our invitation over the past 7 years. We're able to do this work because of the hard work and dedication of the Friends!"

After a year in which we learned daily about the demands of striking workers, from baristas in cafes to autoworkers to actors in Hollywood, we will be high-

lighting the history of the labor movement with a propulsive and entertaining novel entitled *The Cold Millions* by bestselling author Jess Walter.

The Cold Millions tells the tale of two brothers swept up in the turbulent class warfare and free speech fights of the early 20th century. The Dolans live by their wits, jumping freight trains and lining up for day work at crooked job agencies. While Rye yearns for a steady job and a home, his older brother, Gig, dreams of a better world, fighting alongside other union men for fair pay and decent treatment. Dubious of Gig's idealism, Rye still finds himself drawn to a fearless 19-year-old activist named Elizabeth Gurley Flynn. A storm is coming, and Rye will be forced to decide where he stands. Is it enough to win the occasional battle, even if you cannot win the war?

As one reviewer wrote, "*The Cold Millions* is a literary unicorn: a book about socio-economic disparity that's also a page-turner and a beautiful, lyric hymn to the power of social unrest in American history. It's funny and harrowing, sweet and violent, innocent and experienced; it walks a dozen tightropes."

Discussion group registration in underway. You can register for a Library-facilitated group or you can form your own group with three or more people. To learn more about discussion groups and to register, visit *aclibrary.org/castro-valley-reads*.

Our Kick-Off Event is Sunday, February 4 from 2 pm to 3 pm. You'll learn more about the book and be able to pick up a free copy, while supplies last. We'll sing along as local horn ensemble fun'SQ leads us in rousing renditions of union songs from the 20th century. There is no need to register for the Kick-Off event itself, but please register for a discussion group before you arrive. Through mid-April, in addition to discussion groups, we have a great line up of programs related to the themes of the book. And on Sunday, April 14, featured author Jess Walter will be joining us in person at the Castro Valley Center for the Arts for the Finale event. DONATIONS ALWAYS NEEDED!

The Friends of the Castro Valley Library depend on your generous donations of books, CDs, and DVDs. We are happy to receive your donations any time the BookStore is open (see page 8 for BookStore hours—note we are <u>now</u>

<u>open Sundays</u> from 1:00 to 4:00!). If your donation is more than a few bags or cartons, we will appreciate your contacting us ahead of time to make sure we have staff available to receive it. We are happy to lend you a cart or help you bring your donation inside. Bring your donations directly to the BookStore office door. **Please do not leave donations else**where in- or outside the Library.

At this time, we are accepting donations of most types of books, DVDs, and music CDs as well as magazines that are **no more than 4 months old**. We may also accept jigsaw puzzles, board games, unused greeting cards, and stationery items. We *do not accept* sets of books such as encyclopedias or Time -Life sets, condensed books, textbooks older than 3 years, or books that are dirty, moldy, smoky, or otherwise damaged. We also *cannot accept* VHS or cassette tapes (music or audiobooks) or vinyl records. A good rule of thumb on condition: if you would purchase the item yourself, we will most likely accept it.

Your donation is tax-deductible. We are happy to give you a receipt for your donation. The receipt will specify the number of cartons or bags of books or other items received (so you don't have to stand there and wait for them to be counted.)

Funds received from the sale of these items pay for many library programs and amenities that would not otherwise be available.

If you have questions about donating or how the donations are used, please let us know! **Donation guidelines** are available at the BookStore or on our website.

The Lighthouse Keeper by Alan K. Baker (2020 fiction) : In December of 1900, the three lighthouse keepers on the island of Eilean Mòr went missing. The bodies were never found. This much of the story is true and forms the basis for the fictional story that follows. In 1999, five researchers set up camp on Eilean Mòr. It's a rough area, so they're committed to a three-week stay. Almost immediately their instruments pick up an impossible artifact within the ocean itself. Then one character stumbles across a journal written by one of the replacement keepers in 1901. Things start driving out of control pretty quickly from there. The story switches between the events of 1901 and those in 1999, and it's pretty clear that whatever happened then repeats itself. The story veers between supernatural and science fiction. It's quite a ride, and admittedly sometimes too chaotic to easily follow. But somehow something different than I expected ended up being just what I wanted. (Amber Marsh)

North Woods by Daniel Mason (2023 fiction) is a saga beginning in Pilgrim times and ending in modern day. There are dozens of interlinked stories, interspersed with illustrations, poems, letters and even a page from the Farmer's Almanac. The main character in the book is the yellow house in the North Woods where generations dwell within. Inhabitants include a former soldier who plants an apple orchard, his daughters who never marry, an artist, and a movie star. The New York Times review said, "This is fiction that deals in minutes and in centuries, that captures the glory and the triviality of human lives. The forest and the trees: Mason keeps both in clear view in his eccentric and exhilarating novel." Mason, an assistant professor in Stanford's School of Psychiatry, is a lyric writer. I loved his description of the soldier's daughters: "If life was a song, theirs was more of a refrain, than a verse." So apt! This book is a banquet of stories. Be prepared for the unexpected. Don't miss it! (Robin Olivier)

The Frozen River by Ariel Lawhon (2023 fiction): On the surface, this is a murder mystery, but it is much more than



that. Based on the life of midwife and healer Martha Ballard, the story opens with the discovery of a body in the near -frozen Kennebec River, territory of Maine, in the late 1700's. As one of her duties, Mrs. Ballard is called to give an opinion on the cause of death, which she deems to be murder. But this is a much more complicated tale than seek-

ing out a murderer. As the book unfolds, many interconnected subplots come to bear: a rape, attempted theft of property, relationships, births, and deaths. This wellwritten, well-researched novel is a wonderful cross-section of life, people, and the laws in effect at the time. The characters are real and warm; you like the ones you are supposed to like, and you don't like the villains. At the center of all of this are the frozen Kennebec River, a character in itself, and a silver vixen who reappears at appropriate moments throughout the story. This is a captivating read, and I highly recommend it. (Ginger Russell)

Poetry Takes Flight: Birds of California by James Roethe:

This review is of a singular book familiar to some Friends of the Castro Valley Library as it was introduced to us in November of 2023. *Poetry Takes Flight: Birds of California* by James Roethe was published in 2023. The book comprises the author's descriptions of familiar California birds. Each are shown in



wonderful photographs accompanied by a short description of aspects of the bird's life and/or importance to the author. Jim Roethe then writes a wonderful poem. Often the poem mentions important characteristics of the bird such as size, plumage, habits, and habitats, though even more delightful are words that tell the reader WHY the bird attracted the poet. The poems reflect the writing skills of the author and his joy in being the birdwatcher who loves seeing birds in his travels. This is a fun book to read, not only for those of us interested in birds, but anyone who appreciates the fine use of writing to describe the often-lovely birds at our feeders! (Ned Lyke)

Mary Oliver (1935 – 2019) was a distinguished and beloved American poet who wrote both poetry and narrative books that have received numerous awards (including the Pulitzer Prize in 1984) for their quiet and reflective descriptions of the natural and physical world that caught the perceptive eye of the writer for decades. If one is searching for writing that is comforting, eloquent, loving, transformative and allows escape from the troubled world we now live in, you need go no further than the works of Mary Oliver. Her books may be found in bookstores and libraries throughout Alameda County. (Ned Lyke)

the BookStore any time of year, and don't have to be spent all at once. Ask at the window or give us a call for more information.

Our prices are reasonable! We are the only BookStore in Castro Valley, and you won't find a better bargain for a wide variety of books in good clean condition. Most adult books are \$2. Most children's books are 50¢. Some books may be slightly higher; for example, current releases are \$4, and some gift quality, special, or antiquarian books may be higher-priced but generally less than you would find elsewhere. And DVDs and CDs are only \$1 per disc.

We have a great selection! We receive book and media donations almost daily and have a great variety of both fiction and nonfiction titles and authors. We also stock greeting cards and jigsaw puzzles in the BookStore.

Remember that the funds from all sales of books, DVDs, CDs, etc., pay for library programs that wouldn't otherwise be possible!
