Children's activities are scheduled daily, many of which are funded by the Friends. The first of three outdoor concerts has taken place, with one scheduled in August and another in September. For us, of course, our summer book sale scheduled for August 2, 3, and 4 is foremost in our minds. As always, Friday night from 6-8 is reserved for members of the Friends so that you get first choice of the books, DVDs, and CDs. Saturday is from 10-4 and Bag Day on Sunday from 1-4 is when you can fill one of our paper bags for \$5! I hope the dates are on your calendar. Watch for a \$2 coupon for use at the sale on Saturday in the July 31 Castro Valley Forum.

Thanks to your donations and the eagle eyes of our volunteers, the Friends are having great success selling on eBay. Our eBay team of Amy Fain, Scott Morgan, and Amber Marsh post pictures and descriptions of interesting donated materials on eBay. When someone buys an item (we have had more than one buyer in Europe!), one of the team comes into the store, boxes and wraps the item, weighs it and places postage on it and then takes it to the post office. We are so fortunate to have these hardworking team members willing to put in so much time and effort in creating this offshoot of the Bookstore! There have been times when eBay sales have exceeded those of our Bookstore. Volunteers are always thrilled when they find out that a book they identified as a possible eBay candidate is sold!

Speaking of volunteers, have you considered volunteering in our store or at one of our book sales? The yellow volunteer form is available right in front of our office. Volunteers usually work one three-hour shift a week. We have a volunteer trainer who works with new people to help them learn the procedures. Having been a volunteer myself since 2011, I can tell you that it's a great way to feel part of the community. We have regular customers and it's fun to talk about books with them. I've also become good friends with my coworkers. Please pick up and submit a volunteer form if you're interested. It's been a great and busy summer at the Castro Valley Library! The crowds are back for the Children's programming as we had hoped. We saw large crowds for all our programming, including weekly: Build It Day, Game Day, Movie Day and Performers. Alameda County Firefighters visited us for two separate story times, we did Yoga, debated, wrote poetry and managed a lot of volunteers. We also explored our senses with a lot of handson activities like secret smells and a mystery box challenge.

In July we invited the Red Cross back for a blood drive in our Chabot/Canyon room. It's so interesting to see our meeting room transformed into a lifesaving medical space. It was fun to see some of our regular members come in and give blood, and to see new faces who are regular donors in our community.

We offered another Summer Concert Series this summer, in fact, you can still catch a couple if you like. BEHIND THE SCENES IN YOUR LIBRARY

Do you ever wonder what goes on behind the scenes in your library? Have you ever thought about how the books get to where they belong? Let me tell you! When you see us working at the membership desk, you're seeing a fraction of what we do each day.

In the backroom here at Castro Valley, we have an AMHS (our return machine.) Each hour we have someone scheduled to take the books out of the trolleys they fall into and place them in order on the carts. This person also empties the book drop, checks items in, and places them on carts. When carts get full, our pages wheel the carts out and shelve them. In between shelving, our pages pull all the books that are on hold, to go on our hold shelf or to another branch.

We get deliveries each weekday. These come from

all the other branches to fill the holds our members have placed. Our clerks check in all the books and DVDs from the delivery bins. We get anywhere from 20-45 bins daily. All the items checked in either get put on the hold shelf for members to pick up, or they are put on carts to be shelved. Sometimes it takes all day to get through our delivery!



Our morning duties include pulling items for the Link Plus system and pulling all the expired holds off the hold shelves. These items get checked in and sent to the next person in line, or they go back to their home branch to be re-shelved.

We also deal with any problems that come up, such as books returned with damage or books from a different library system being returned here. We find books that need to be cleaned, books with stickers on them, books stained with food and drink, books with barcodes peeled off, and many other odd things that pop up.

Every day is different for us, and we like it that way! We happily serve our community by being the "keepers of the books" and we love it when we get to interact with our members. We love our library!

DONATIONS ALWAYS NEEDED!



The Friends of the Castro Valley Library depend on your generous donations of books, CDs, and DVDs. We are happy to receive your donations any time the BookStore is open (see page 8 for BookStore hours—note we are now

open Sundays from 1:00 to 4:00!). If your donation is more than a few bags or cartons, we will appreciate your contacting us ahead of time to make sure we have staff available to receive it. We are happy to lend you a cart or help you bring your donation inside. Bring your donations directly to the BookStore office door. Please do not leave donations elsewhere in— or outside the Library.

At this time, we are accepting donations of most types of books, DVDs, and music CDs as well as magazines that are no more than 4 months old. We may also accept jigsaw puzzles, board games, unused greeting cards, and stationery items. We do not accept sets of books such as encyclopedias or Time-Life sets, condensed books, textbooks older than 3 years, or books that are dirty, moldy, smoky, or otherwise damaged. We also cannot accept VHS or cassette tapes (music or audiobooks) or vinyl records. A good rule of thumb on condition: if you would purchase the item yourself, we will most likely accept it.

Your donation is tax-deductible. We are happy to give you a receipt for your donation. The receipt will specify the number of cartons or bags of books or other items received (so you don't have to stand there and wait for them to be counted.)

Funds received from the sale of these items pay for many library programs and amenities that would not otherwise be available.

If you have questions about donating or how the donations are used, please let us know! **Donation guidelines** are available at the BookStore or on our website.

The Serpent and the Wings of Night by Carissa Broadbent (2022 fiction): As a current lover of all things Sarah J. Maas and Rebecca Yarros, and a former Twilight fanatic, I find this book to be a pure gem. Set within an empirebuilding age of familiarity, the protagonist is a woman like no other, Oraya. Her struggles and successes in finding her power had me cheering her on each page as she balanced a gauntlet-like challenge with the imposing struggle of the creatures within the world around her – vampires and humans – and an epic love story that gives Bella/Edward, Bryce/Hunt, and Xaden/Violet a run for their money. I could not put it down. (Andrea Struve)

The Secret Lives of Booksellers and Librarians, edited by James Patterson, et.al. (2024 nonfiction): This is a collection of many anecdotes (from 3 to maybe 10 pages each)



written by booksellers and librarians across the U.S. and Canada. Inspiring and enlightening, funny and wise, each selection describes a part of the writer's life – how their career began, an especially wonderful event that happened, how their particular job helped someone, or how someone helped them. Topics include banned

books, a library's or bookstore's place in the community, encouraging children to read, researching and finding information, and other tasks encountered in the course of a day or a year. This was the perfect book for a volunteer in a library bookstore. Perhaps it would also be the perfect book for you! Even if you're not in one of these professions, you will appreciate them all the more. (Ginger Russell)

The Fox Wife by Yangsze Choo (2024 fiction): In 1908 Manchuria, a courtesan is found frozen to death in a doorway. There are rumors of foxes, who are said to take the

form of beautiful women and handsome men. Bao, a detective with the ability to discern when people tell lies, is hired to find the woman's identity. Meanwhile, a family who owns a famous medicine shop can cure ailments, but they aren't able to find a way to escape a curse that has caused the death of eldest sons before their 24th birthday. Hiring



a beautiful servant named Snow seems to change their luck. Snow has many secrets, but mostly she is seeking vengeance for the death of her daughter. She follows the trail of the murderer from China to Japan, while Bao doggedly follows the same path, as they encounter old friends and spirits. The Fox Wife is a fantastic and stunning novel about mortals, spirits, and love. (Ginger Russell)

The Good Girl Complex by Elle Kennedy (2022 fiction): Elle Kennedy does not disappoint with this contemporary romance! She sets the scene early on in a tale as old as time: a quiet beach town engaged in a battle between the tight-knit locals and the wealthy tourists and college students. However, the tense setting is the last predictable thing about this romantic read. From a revenge bet to finding one's voice and what it means to feel at home. Mackenzie (Mac) and Cooper Hartley's love story is one for the books (pun intended). (Andrea Struve)

The Paris Novel by Ruth Reichl, (2024 fiction): If ever there was a summer novel to read, it is this one! Do you dream of spending some time in Paris? Do you love gourmet food? Would you consider becoming a "Tumbleweed" in the famed Shakespeare and Company bookstore? How about vintage clothes, possibly trying on a Dior? All of this is happening to Stella in 1983 whose estranged mother leaves her a ticket to Paris as her inheritance. For Stella, this is definitely out of her comfort zone. She is a copy editor

for a small printing company who plans every moment of her life. Once she arrives in Paris, she begins to meet interesting people and tries doing things on the spur of the moment. Ruth Reichl, the author and former editor of Gourmet magazine and restaurant critic, of course places Stella in many culinary spots throughout the novel and her description of food few of us have regularly tasted add to the adventure. There is also a search for an artist which takes Stella to fascinating libraries and bookstores. Losing her hotel room, takes her to the famed



Shakespeare and Company bookstore where George Whitman, the legendary owner allows her to stay in an alcove as a Tumbleweed, someone who stays for free, but does odd jobs as needed. There's so much more—romance, looking for her father, but hopefully just this is tempting you. Please give this book a try. You know it can't be real, but wouldn't it be fun? (Robin Olivier)

She and Ned were enthusiastic travelers with Road Scholar, visiting many areas of the world, expanding their knowledge of the natural world, people of other countries, and making many new life-long friends.

Coming soon is the revitalization of the library's little pocket park affectionally called "Sage Park". Sage Park will wrap around the front entrance of the library, both east and west sides and will showcase native plants in the Bay Area. resistance, reduction of pesticide use, and protection of the environment, mainly our creeks and waterways.

Heading up the work to bring Sage Park back is Forestr.org, a nonprofit group with a pas-

sion for greening Castro Valley and nearby areas. Forestr will be conducting workdays to clean, construct, and replant Sage Park.
