During the summer, we had a very successful book sale in August and we are so grateful to the volunteers who made it happen as well as all the shoppers! On late Sunday, we were able to make free books available to a prison program, a Friends' store in the San Joaquin Valley and to our local Little Free Libraries. Everyone wins!!

Our next book sale is the first weekend of December. The Friday night sale is on December 6 from 6-8 p.m. for members only. As always, members get first chance to peruse our great book, audio and video selections. There will also be specially priced books that will be wonderful holiday gifts. New membership cards will also be available to purchase at this time. The sale on Saturday, the 7th, is from 10-4 and on Sunday, December 8, we will have our \$5 a bag sale from 12-4. If you are buying children's books, please be sure to look at the collection of audible children's books. The library discontinued these and gave them to the Friends to sell. It's a great selection from pre-school to middle school levels. You'll find them in the children's section of the sale. Watch for a \$2 off coupon in the December 4 Forum for use at Saturday's sale!

Our eBay team has continued to bring in over \$1000 a month in sales. We recently sold a book to a person in Puerto Rico! Our team of Amy Fain, Scott Morgan, Wayne Ainsworth, Amber Marsh and Nancy Gee work diligently to Identify books and other material that is better placed on line than in our bookstore. They are supported by the volunteers who spot potential sale items. Then the hands-on work begins as items sell, members of the team box, weigh, label and mail them. It is labor intensive! We are so grateful that our volunteers have really entered into this endeavor with enthusiasm!

MESSAGE FROM THE LIBRARY MANAGER

We just celebrated our 15th birthday at the "new" library on Norbridge Ave! It's difficult to imagine how quickly the time has gone, and I still meet people who have lived here a long time and are visiting for the first time.

We had a great summer! Summer Adventure programming and our Summer Concert Series were the highlights for me. We had 3 concerts this summer in our parking lot after closing. Hundreds of people came to listen to live music and commune. Bands ranged from local performers, Dee Dee Coco and Mark Hummel to Broken Compass Bluegrass. If you missed out, please check in next summer.

I'm pleased to share that your library is the new home of an Artemis Generation "Moon Tree." Out of hundreds of applications, NASA selected local nonprofit ForestR.org with Castro Valley Library as the recipients of



one of the seedlings generated from seeds that flew around the moon aboard Artemis I in 2022. After returning to Earth, the tree seeds germinated under the care of the United States Department of Agriculture Forest Service as the work to identify their new homes was underway. NASA chose institutions based on criteria that evaluated their suitability to care for the various tree species and their ability to maximize educational oppor-

tunities around the life and growth of the tree in their communities.

The tree was named "Lana Luna" after local resident Lana Carlos. Lana Carlos was a bright, young community member who was tragically killed in February 2020. Lana loved space, nature, reading and writing and the library. We were honored to name the Artemis tree after her. We also had a storytime, Storywalk®, a child car seat safety check with the CHP and more to provide families with children an opportunity to learn about traffic safety.

We planned lots of educational opportunities at the library to celebrate our new addition, including a solar system family storytime, and other space related author events.

We were also joined by Jessica Cruz, Atmospheric Scientist from the Atmospheric, Earth, and Energy Division of the Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory. Ms. Cruz shared information about her work preparing the Mars Rover and other vehicles for travel in space, human preparation for space travel, eating and growing plants in space, and more.

We are also actively planning for the 8th Annual Castro Valley Reads! We are excited to share next year's title with our members. I encourage you to join our community reads event and see what happens when we all read the same book. Teasers coming soon! Our author event will be in person at the Douglas Morrison Theatre in April 2025.

We've Got More Than Books at the Library!

By borrowing seeds, growing a plant and sending seeds back to our seed library, you'll be helping us keep our seed library program going. In addition, we'll be hosting workshops and events on gardening, composting and more at the kickoff to the growing season this spring. You can also find resources for growing and harvesting food and seeds on the library's website.

The holidays are upon us so mark your calendars for holiday concerts coming this December! Saturday, December 14th local favorites, *In Full Swing Big Band*, perform seasonal classics with a fun, big-band twist! The fun continues Sunday, December 15th with *FunSq*, a saxophone quartet performing holiday music the whole family can enjoy! DONATIONS ALWAYS NEEDED!



The Friends of the Castro Valley Library depend on your generous donations of books, CDs, and DVDs. We are happy to receive your donations any time the BookStore is open. If your donation is more than a few bags or cartons, we will appreciate your contacting us ahead of time to make sure we have

staff available to receive it. We are happy to lend you a cart or help you bring your donation inside. Bring your donations directly to the BookStore office door. Please do not leave donations elsewhere in – or outside the Library.

Please note that we may not accept donations the 2 weeks prior to a big book sale due to time and space constraints. If at all possible, save your donation until the weeks after the sale. (Thank you!!)

At this time, we are accepting donations of most types of books, DVDs, and music CDs as well as magazines that are no more than 4 months old. We may also accept jigsaw puzzles, board games, unused greeting cards, and stationery items. We do not accept sets of books such as encyclopedias or Time-Life sets, condensed books, textbooks older than 3 years, or books that are dirty, moldy, smoky, or otherwise damaged. We also cannot accept VHS or cassette tapes (music or audiobooks) or vinyl records. A good rule of thumb on condition: if you would purchase the item yourself, we will most likely accept it.

Your donation is tax-deductible. We are happy to give you a receipt for your donation. The receipt will specify the number of cartons or bags of books or other items received (so you don't have to stand there and wait for them to be counted.)

Funds received from the sale of these items pay for many library programs and amenities that would not otherwise be available.

If you have questions about donating or how the donations are used, please let us know! **Donation guidelines** are available at the BookStore or on our website.

2025 Memberships Available Now!

Your Friends of the Castro Valley Library membership is renewable as of January 1st each year. Membership cards for 2025 will be available November 4th! Even if you are already a member, we still need a new application form filled out in order to verify that your information is correct. You may renew at the Friends BookStore office inside the library, by mail, or through our website. When renewing by mail, if you include a self-addressed, stamped envelope, we will mail your membership card to you; otherwise, please arrange to pick it up from the office. Please allow a couple of weeks for processing time before picking up your card.

Even if you have used your BookStore coupons, your 2024 card still includes a coupon for the December book sale, so don't dispose of it until after the sale.

Sipsworth by Simon Van Booy (2024 fiction): After a tragic loss, Helen Cartwright has left her home in Australia and returned to the village in England in which she grew up. In a very pragmatic way, she prepares for her end.

The author empathetically helps us imagine the loneliness of aging. Helen becomes curious about what others are throwing out and inspects a neighbor's curbside discards. A fish tank is there, and it brings back memories of her son's childhood. She brings it in with the deep-sea diver doll inside. In time, she notices something about a box which had been inside the tank. She sees "a pair of



tiny eyes and a pink nose". Now a dilemma—how to dispose of this mouse without injuring him. This is a charming story, recommended by author Ann Patchett, who puts out a list of summer books to read on NPR. She said she loved it and I did too!! (Robin Olivier)

By Any Other Name by Jodi Picoult (2024 fiction): Having been a Literature major in college and familiar with Shakespeare and his cohorts, I was surprised (and pleased) to learn that one of the Bard's alleged collaborators was a woman named Emilia Bassano. This is her story, as well as that of Melina Greene, a fictional present-day relation. As a struggling playwright, Melina is convinced that the theater community is prejudiced against women, but 10




years out of college, she discovers Emilia and writes a play about her. Melina's roommate Andre submits the play to a festival without her knowledge and under a male pseudonym. The play is accepted with accolades, creating a situation neither of them had foreseen. In another era, Emilia lives an unexpected life, first sold by her family

as a mistress to the Lord Chamberlain and later forcibly married to the husband nobody wanted (especially Emilia). She becomes acquainted with the theater community through the Lord Chamberlain and begins to write poetry. She also falls in love with the young Earl of Southampton and begins an affair that shapes the rest of her life. Eventually, she writes plays, which she sells to William Shakespeare in order to keep her married home solvent. This is a book that is steeped in the language of Shakespeare's plays; lines of dialogue appear both as quotes and as words spoken by the characters. The author challenges the reader to pick them out and provides an index at the end. While it seems that someone who studied Elizabethan literature might get more out of the book, this isn't necessarily so, as Melina's story is completely contemporary and draws parallels between present and past. The more I read, the more I enjoyed this book, and I shed a few tears at the end. (Ginger Russell)

Outrage by Brian Copeland (2024 fiction): Outrage is a mystery about the murders of police officers who killed unarmed Black men and were never held to account. The main characters are brother and sister – an investigative reporter on TV and a San Francisco homicide cop - with a combative/protective relationship that will probably sound familiar to anyone with a sibling. The author, Brian Copeland, is better known for his one-man comedy shows, including "Not a Genuine Black Man". He brings that same humor to this novel which tells the story with a serviceable plot. But the best part of the book for me, and maybe for all other local residents, is that it's set in Castro Valley. Local references are sprinkled throughout. I enjoyed having familiar locations and businesses pop up in the story. There is a surprise ending that ties up the story neatly. (Stephanie Dorward)

The Golden Gate by Amy Chua (2023 fiction): What initially caught my attention was that this book is set in the Bay Area, and most of it in Berkeley and its environs. The mystery concerns two deaths that take place at the Claremont Hotel, one in the 1930s and one ten years later in 1944, during the height of WWII. Coincidentally, the same prominent family is involved in both. The first was a child who

seemingly accidentally fell down a laundry chute. The second was a candidate for President of the United States. The main, first-person character is a police detective, Al Sullivan, a tough cookie who sometimes does things right and sometimes not. The narrative reminds me of Joe Friday. Tasked with bringing the murderer to justice, Sullivan discovers the link with the Bainbridge family and oddly, with Madame Chiang Kai-Shek, whose brief resi-



dence in Berkeley coincides with the time frame. Some murder mysteries are described as having twists. Reading this one is more like playing a ping-pong game, as each suspect is on-again, off-again, leading one through a convoluted series of truths and lies as Sullivan chases lead after lead. There are a number of subplots, including Sullivan's 11-year -old niece Miriam, who is just shy of delinquency, and the undercurrent of racism against not only the Japanese but anyone who isn't white. This is a gripping novel that is quite readable but pay attention lest you miss something important. (Ginger Russell)

During the past fiscal year ending September 30 we had three successful big book sales and e-Bay on-line book sales. The funds generated from these sales together with
