After the sale is over, the remaining books are given to a company that redistributes them. We've had some challenges in the past with this part of the sale, but thanks in a large part to board member, Roger Caswell, this went off without a hitch in December! Thanks again, Roger!

Our book choice(s) for our 8th annual Castro Valley Reads were announced in early January. *The House of Broken Angels* by Luis Alberto Urrea is our selection for 2025. We are so pleased to be able to provide the community with another opportunity to come together, read and discuss the same book. Please consider joining other community members for a book discussion group at the library or in your homes. Tell your neighbors. We'll provide the books!

We have had a lot of wonderful programming planned for CV Reads this year, tamale making classes, Mexican History of California, music, dance and more!

In April, we will interview the national bestselling author, Luis Alberto Urrea to discuss *The House of Broken Angels* in person. We are very excited to have our author in person for the first time since 2019. Join us at the Douglas Morrison Theatre for a lively discussion about our 2025 Community Reads pick. Your free book (while supplies last) and program guide will be available at the library anytime beginning February 2 during or after our kick-off event (see Chris Selig's column for more information).

This is also our 6th annual Tweens Read event. The tweens are reading THE CIRCUIT, a graphic novel adaptation of Francisco Jimenez's novel THE CIRCUIT: STO-RIES FROM THE LIFE OF A MIGRANT CHILD, which was one of four of his middle grade (award-winning) autobiographies. "The exquisite illustrations are warm and weathered, perfectly complementing the emotional story-telling. A poignant, beautiful story of family, endurance, and appreciation." — *Kirkus Reviews* (starred review). Tweens will have the option between two discussion groups to discuss the selection.

Of course, the Friends have played a primary role in providing funding for most of the events this year. As usual, this library wouldn't be the vibrant community gathering place without the funding of our Friends. Thank you for continuing to support their efforts and consider volunteering if you are able. It's truly a community here at the library.

March is Flood Safety Month. The October 2024 Spanish floods brought over a year's worth of precipitation to several areas in Spain and unfortunately, people were not prepared. San Francisco recently had a tornado warning; these are unprecedented weather events. Please check out Ready.gov (https://www.ready.gov/ floods) for more information on floods (and other emergencies). Some advice from www.ready.gov:

- Evacuate immediately, if told to evacuate. Never drive around barricades. Local responders use them to safely direct traffic out of flooded areas.
- Listen to EAS, NOAA Weather Radio or local alerting systems for current emergency information and instructions regarding flooding.
- Do not walk, swim or drive through flood waters. Turn Around. Don't Drown!

Castro Valley Reads 2025

We need stories. We need stories to understand ourselves. We especially need to read stories about people who are different from ourselves. We need to open ourselves up to those stories and find ways of thinking of "others" as having commonalities with "us."

That's an opportunity we've tried to provide with Castro Valley Reads, now in its 8th year. Thank you for the trust you've placed in us to choose our featured book and to design the programs. Thanks to the Friends of the Library for the continued funding!

For 2025 we've chosen a work of contemporary fiction called *The House of Broken Angels* by Luis Alberto Urrea.

The plot is simple enough. In his final days, beloved and ailing patriarch Miguel Angel de La Cruz, affectionately called Big Angel, has summoned his entire clan for one last legendary birthday party. But as the party approaches, his mother, nearly one hundred, dies, transforming the



weekend into a farewell doubleheader.

The magic of this book comes in the telling. Imagine a tornado picking up speed as it whirls through and around each character: Big Angel, his wife Perla, his half-brother Little Angel, his children, parents, in-laws, grandchildren, and neighbors. The tornado dislodges and blends their memories, foibles, regrets, desires, joys and grief through rapid fire dialogues and interior monologues. As we learn tales that have passed into family lore, we are treated to a depiction of the de La Cruz family that is at turns tragic, bawdy, funny, joyful, and, ultimately, about love and grace.

Luis Alberto Urrea's amazing book will allow us to celebrate Mexican American culture and history and to think about immigration and the border. Understanding these characters and his fast-paced writing style offers you a chance to reach outside of your own culture and experiences, to practice empathy, and have a lot of laughs.

The author of 19 books in various genres, Urrea is most well-known for *The Devil's Highway*, his nonfiction account of a group of Mexican immigrants lost in the Arizona desert, which was a finalist for the Pulitzer Prize. Urrea is also the author of *Hummingbird's Daughter*, *Into the Beautiful North*, and his latest, *Good Night, Irene*. In 2017, Urrea won an American

DONATIONS ALWAYS NEEDED!



The Friends of the Castro Valley Library depend on your generous donations of books, CDs, and DVDs. We are happy to receive your donations any time the BookStore is open. If your donation is more than a few bags or cartons, we will appreciate your contacting us ahead of time to make sure we have

staff available to receive it. We are happy to lend you a cart or help you bring your donation inside. Bring your donations directly to the BookStore office door. Please do not leave donations elsewhere in – or outside the Library.

Please note that we may not accept donations the 2 weeks prior to a big book sale due to time and space constraints. If at all possible, save your donation until the weeks after the sale. (Thank you!!)

At this time, we are accepting donations of most types of books, DVDs, and music CDs as well as magazines that are **no more than 4 months old**. We may also accept jigsaw puzzles, board games, unused greeting cards, and stationery items. We *do not accept* sets of encyclopedias or similar books, condensed books, older textbooks, or books that are dirty, moldy, smoky, or otherwise damaged. We also *cannot accept* VHS or cassette tapes (music or audiobooks) or vinyl records. A good rule of thumb on condition: if you would purchase the item yourself, we will most likely accept it.

Your donation is tax-deductible. We are happy to give you a receipt for your donation. The receipt will specify the number of cartons or bags of books or other items received (so you don't have to stand there and wait for them to be counted.)

Funds received from the sale of these items pay for many library programs and amenities that would not otherwise be available.

If you have questions about donating or how the donations are used, please let us know! <u>Donation guidelines</u> are available at the BookStore or on our website.

Not a member yet? New memberships may be purchased any time of year.



The Mirror by Nora Roberts (2024 fiction): This is the second book in the "Lost Bride Trilogy." The first book, *The Inheritance*, was released about a year ago. Starting at the beginning, Sonya MacTavish inherits a mansion in Maine from an uncle she did not



know she had. There is a condition to the inheritance that requires her to spend a certain amount of time in the house, a murder scene for seven family brides. Having broken her engagement and left her job in Boston at the same time, she decides to move in and discovers she is living with many benevolent spirits and one angry ghost. Thus far in the series, Sonya has started her own


business. Her best friend has moved in with her, and being a Nora Roberts book, each is in a successful relationship. Sonya discovers she has a wonderful family she didn't know existed. She has also discovered a "magic mirror" that gives her access to the past. The fly in the ointment is Hester Dobbs, the angry ghost who has caused the deaths of the seven brides and stolen their wedding rings. If Sonya can get the rings back, Hester will be gone. Yes, there is a lot of the supernatural in this series, but I am finding it to be reasonably realistic and a darn good ghost story. I do recommend reading *The Inheritance* first. And now I am impatiently waiting for the third book to come out. (Ginger Russell)

Rules of Civility by Amor Towles (2011 fiction): Towles, who is the well-known author of A Gentleman in Moscow and The Lincoln Highway, began his literary career with this book. Mostly set in New York City during the late 1930's, it brings to mind all the famous movies we watched glorifying "old New York". The story is told by Katey Kontent, real name, Katya. She comes to New York with hopes for her future. Like many young women of that era, she lives in a boarding house for women. There are clear rules about who enters the building and when meals are. The other women living there have many interesting stories. Soon, Katey shares a room with Eve. Eve comes from plenty of family money but chooses to be independent from her parents, sending money back when they offer it. The girls go out on New Year's Eve with the plan of stretching their \$3 as far

as it would go. Their plan had been to drink early and then go to a Ukrainian diner whose late-night special was "coffee, eggs, and toast for fifteen cents". By 11:00, they had twenty cents left between them when "he" came into the club. The girls were immediately impressed and lucky for them, so was he. Without giving away the story, meeting him placed the girls in a whole new world that is so much fun (mostly) to read about. If you read this book, which I hope you will, there is a follow-up book that Towles recently wrote entitled Table for Two. It is comprised of a few short stories and at the end, a novella telling the story of Eve after she leaves New York. Towles is a powerful narrative writer and a keen developer of characters. It's hard to believe that this was his first book. (Robin Olivier)

How to Read a Book by Monica Wood (2024 fiction): Harriet Larson, a retired English teacher, conducts a prison book club. One of the prisoners is Violet Powell, who has served 22 months for a drunk driving

crash that killed a local teacher. She is about to be released. Frank Daigle is the widower of the kindergarten teacher who died in the accident. They all have their ghosts and their family secrets, and when the three of them meet accidentally at a bookstore, some of the secrets are released. This is a big-hearted novel which demonstrates that even



when life has handed you a difficult

situation, someone will help you succeed. One of the most enjoyable parts of the novel relates to a group of amazing African Gray parrots, and it's worth reading just for those chapters. But you become invested in all of the characters, so start at the beginning and read to the end. It is a quick, enjoyable read. (Ginger Russell)

- Stay off bridges over fast-moving water. Fastmoving water can wash bridges away without warning.
- Stay inside your car if it is trapped in rapidly moving water. Get on the roof if water is rising inside the car.
- Get to the highest level if trapped in a building. Only get on the roof if necessary and once there, signal for help. Do not climb into a closed attic to avoid getting trapped by rising floodwater.

Preparedness is the best move to protect yourself and others. Be safe and hope to see you at the library this year!

who currently live in Sacramento and Santa Cruz.


