### MESSAGE FROM THE LIBRARY MANAGER

Our 8<sup>th</sup> annual Castro Valley Reads is officially over. Our theme this year, Mexican American culture and history, was as well timed with the recent immigration exchanges as we could have made it. We had a well-attended the finale/interview with the author, Luis Alberto Urrea, in person! We are grateful to Luis Urrea for meeting with us, having a stimulating conversation about his book and Mexican American culture, and we enjoyed a delicious treat of tamales from La Guerrera's Kitchen in Oakland.

The programming around Castro Valley Reads was thought provoking and relevant. We offered a program on Mexican migrants in California with Dr. Pablo Gonzalez from the Department of Ethnic Studies at UC Berkeley, multiple Tamalada for Book Lovers where culinary instructor and author Annelies Zijderveld taught us to make tamales, and Francisco Jiminez, author of The Circuit, spoke to a crowd of over 100 about his autobiography. We're already thinking about next year's title!

**Our 4<sup>th</sup> annual Earth Day** event with ForestR took place on Saturday April 26<sup>th</sup>. It was a beautiful day filled with great information and demonstrations about gardening, woodworking, the environment, free fruit and seeds.

**AARP was back** in person to provide Tax Aide this season. The AARP provided tax assistance for over 300 participants. This is such a great example of what libraries can provide for our communities. We really appreciate our AARP volunteers.

We had a wonderful new program this past March with Mick LaSalle, Reel Talk. A movie club with the San Francisco Chronicle's long-time film critic Mick LaSalle. Participants watched a movie and considered questions from LaSalle, then everyone gathered to discuss the film. We hope to offer another program before the year is out.

This June we offer a program on Navigating Death and Dying 101. This frank conversation with two death doulas will cover pragmatic preparations to pondering the mystery. Death is the one life event that awaits us all and there will be something for everyone.

Of course, the Friends have played a primary role in providing funding for most of the events we offer. As usual, this library wouldn't be the vibrant community gathering place without the funding of our Friends. Thank you for continuing to support their efforts.

#### CHILDREN'S PROGRAM NEWS

Children's services continue to grow with a diverse range of programs! Since last quarter, we've introduced several new events, including an Elephant and



Piggie Party, a Dog Man Celebration, a Pokémon Party, and Star Wars Day. Program turnout is always unpredictable, but we hope for the best – and the response to Elephant and Piggie exceeded all expectations! We were thrilled to welcome Elephant & Piggie in person for photos with all the little ones, including a onemonth-old! The line stretched from our program room to the

far corner of the children's area. Our goal is to continue providing a space where our community can come together, celebrate shared interests, and connect with fellow fans!

We've expanded our Storytime offerings to create more engaging experiences for young children! Our new additions include Toddler Storytime, designed to foster early literacy through interactive stories and movement, and Signing & Music Storytime, which introduces basic sign language through songs and playful activities. These special Storytimes also provide a wonderful opportunity for parents and children to connect and learn together.

There's something happening at the library every day this summer! Our summer programming runs from June 9<sup>th</sup> through July 24<sup>th</sup>, offering a variety of activities for kids and teens. Mondays are all about creativity with Build It Mondays, where children can experiment with Legos and other building materials. Tuesdays bring friendly competition with Game Day, featuring both classic and modern board games, along

with video gaming fun. Wednesdays will be full of excitement as special performers take the stage, including wild animal shows, magicians, puppet shows, and an interactive music performance. On Thursdays, kids can unwind with an afternoon movie, featuring newly released films.

## **DONATIONS ALWAYS NEEDED!**



The Friends of the Castro Valley Library depend on your generous donations of books, CDs, and DVDs. We are happy to receive your donations any time the BookStore is open. If your donation is more than a few bags or cartons, we will appreciate your contacting us ahead of time to make sure we have

staff available to receive it. We are happy to lend you a cart or help you bring your donation inside. Bring your donations directly to the BookStore office door. Please do not leave donations elsewhere in – or outside the Library.

Please note that we may not accept donations the 2 weeks prior to a big book sale due to time and space constraints. If at all possible, save your donation until the weeks after the sale. (Thank you!!)

At this time, we are accepting donations of most types of books, DVDs, and music CDs as well as magazines that are no more than 4 months old. We may also accept jigsaw puzzles, board games, unused greeting cards, and stationery items. We do not accept sets of encyclopedias or similar books, condensed books, older textbooks, or books that are dirty, moldy, smoky, or otherwise damaged. We also cannot accept VHS or cassette tapes (music or audiobooks) or vinyl records. A good rule of thumb on condition: if you would purchase the item yourself, we will most likely accept it.

Your donation is tax-deductible. We are happy to give you a receipt for your donation. The receipt will specify the number of cartons or bags of books or other items received (so you don't have to stand there and wait for them to be counted.)

**Funds received from the sale** of these items pay for many library programs and amenities that would not otherwise be available.

My Magnolia Summer by Victoria Benton Frank (2023 fiction): For many years, one of my favorite authors has been Dorothea Benton Frank. When she passed away a few years ago, I was bereft. Lo and behold, though, I re-



cently discovered that her daughter Victoria had come out with a novel in 2023. While her writing style is not exactly the same (nor would you want it to be), My Magnolia Summer takes place in the South Carolina Lowcountry on Sullivan's Island, and it is a delightful family-oriented story. Magnolia Adams, a professional chef, has been living in New York and working at a Michelin star restaurant when her beloved grandmother is injured in an accident. Magnolia returns to her

home on Sullivan's Island to find many changes have taken place, including that the family's restaurant, The Magic Lantern, has been taken over by her alcoholic mother and her mother's boyfriend Buster and changed into a seafood shack which has lost all of the local customers. While the family is waiting for Grandmother Rose to regain consciousness, Buster dies of a heart attack, making the bad situation worse. Magnolia had fully intended to return to New York, but she and her sister Violet take back the restaurant and try to change the menu and regain the customers. This is a heartwarming story with many subplots and endearing characters, totally predictable, but enjoyable all the same. Victoria Benton Frank is a graduate of the College of Charleston and the French Culinary Institute, sharing many cooking techniques and tips in the course of the novel. Her second book will appear later in 2025. (Ginger Russell)

The Stolen Queen by Fiona Davis (2025 fiction): Fiona Davis novels are based on buildings. She has written such novels as The Dollhouse (the Barbizon), The Address (the Dakota), The Masterpiece (Grand Central Terminal), The Lions of Fifth Avenue (the New York Public Library), and now The Stolen Queen, most of which takes place in the New York Metropolitan Museum. In 1978, Charlotte Cross is an Egyptologist, curator of the Museum's Egyptian collection, but in 1936, she participated in archaeological digs in Egypt, where she discovers what may be the tomb of a female Pharoah. After tragedy strikes, she returns to New York to recover and bury herself in the Museum. A relic from her long-ago dig shows up as a donation, setting off a new search for her Queen of Egypt. At the same time, Annie Jenkins falls into the position of assistant to Diana Vreeland, curator of the Museum's fashion collection, where she is immediately but briefly successful until

the Met Gala is sabotaged and a damaged bust of the same Queen, one of the most celebrated items in the Museum's Egyptian collection is stolen. In an attempt to trace the stolen sculpture and reconcile events in Charlotte's past, she and Annie embark on a trip to Egypt, where they discover astonishing information. This is a well-researched, fast-moving novel that grabs your interest and doesn't let go until the end. I highly recommend it, as



well as any of the other Fiona Davis books. (Ginger Russell)

Susan, Linda, Nina, & Cokie: The Extraordinary Story of the Founding Mothers of NPR by Lisa Napoli (2021 group biography): It seems fitting in a time when the very existence of NPR and PBS is being questioned to read the historical beginnings of these important public stations. Even after the passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, it was hard for women to find jobs other than secretarial in the workplace. If there was a token woman in the office, that was all that was needed. Especially in the news business, women were rarely hired. In the preface to the book, an NBC network radio executive in 1964 is quoted as saying: Many women may be fine in everyday conversation but put them in front of a microphone - and a camera as well - and something happens to them. They become affected, overdramatic, high-pitched . . . But with a man you seldom have this problem. However, when National Public Radio was established in the 1970's, a new opportunity opened for women and these four jumped into the new world with both feet. Susan Stamberg was the first woman to anchor a nightly news program. Linda Wertheimer, having won a National Merit Scholarship, left New Mexico for Wellesley and later an exchange program introduced her to the BBC, which gave her an edge for a radio job back in the USA. Nina Totenberg started out as the only staff writer to a minor newsletter and eventually was assigned to the legal beat. Cokie Roberts was the daughter of Representative Hale Boggs of Louisiana and eventually made her way to NPR. Each of these women faced gender discrimination in finding work in the new industry. The story of their challenges, successes, and lasting friendships makes this book fascinating to read. (Robin Olivier)

## ONLINE SHOPPING

**Did you know** you can get great deals on used books online at businesses such as eBay? Prices are not as good as in our BookStore, but for certain books, such as recent mysteries and adult fiction, you can often buy them for \$4 to \$5 each. You can also find unusual or rare items at competitive prices.

eBay was started in 1995 with a broken laser pointer as its first sale. When it went public in 1998, a strong part of its success was hosting resales of Beanie Babies. They now sell

everything from cars to gold bars. Amazon and Walmart also sell used books, and there are internet vendors who specialize in books.

**Popularity of books for sale** on eBay is tracked by the WatchCount website by counting how many people put them in their account watchlists. Currently, the most watched books relate to herbal remedies, prepping for disasters, and foraging for wild foods.

March was a banner month for Friends eBay sales, with over 50 items sold. There were 28 nonfiction books, including several medical and fishing books. In fiction, 11 adult and children's books were sold. Plus one pharmaceutical plastic model head.
