The Friends hitched on to an amazing Rain Forest presentation (featuring a macaw, an anteater and more!) to have a Pop-Up Children's Book Sale in June where we charged book sale prices for the books—a quarter apiece. Thanks to Sue Israel's organization, we made over \$200 and dozens of happy readers. Buyers were so enthusiastic that by the time we brought the second table outside, the first one had almost sold out!

Two Thursday evening concerts have occurred, with the third one scheduled for August 14. Do think about attending it! Just bring a folding chair and sit in the parking lot and enjoy a free concert! Children's summer programing has kept the building hopping 4 days of the week. Our children's librarians, Leo and Angela, do a super job of program planning and the children love it. It's been a great and busy summer at the Castro Valley Library! The crowds are back for our Children's programming as we had hoped. We've been seeing large crowds for all of our programming, including weekly: Build It Day, Game Day, Movie Day and Performers. Reel Talk with Mick LaSalle was in June, it's like a book club, but with movies! Debate 101 for tweens and young teens, a 4-week program created by teens. Death and Dying 101 gave us an opportunity to discuss the great beyond and to think about what we would like the end of our lives to look like. In Full Swing Big Band was also here in July.

Speaking of concerts, this year marks our 5th annual Summer Concert Series this summer, in fact, you can still catch the last one if you like. CALDECOTT MEDAL SELECTION

The Caldecott Medal is the award issued annually by the Association for Library Service to Children (ALSC), a division of the American Library Associa-

tion, for the "most distinguished American picture book for children." Previous winners have included such classics as The Snowy Day by Ezra Jack Keats (1963), Where the Wild Things Are (1964) and Frog and Toad are Friends by Arnold Lobel (a 1971 Honor title).



The committee of folks choosing the winner rotates each year and is comprised of ALSC members who are primarily youth services librarians in public and school libraries. A committee of 15 people are working year-round to discover, read and evaluate picture books published in the United States and illustrated by a citizen or resident of the United States.

I am thrilled to be serving on this year's committee and am enjoying seeing all the picture books. The first few months of the year was an agonizing wait and then they started trickling in. First a couple in an envelope, then a box, then five boxes, then ten! I've received well over 250 picture books now and more arrive almost daily. A couple of secrets about me: I love snail mail. And I love presents. Imagine my delight that both are arriving constantly. I've never been so excited to see the delivery people!

While the committee members have been meeting online to get to know each other and practice the work of respectful and thoughtful discussions, the real work begins this month when we begin to discuss the books under consideration. The fifteen of us come from all over the U.S. and we will finally meet in person for the first time in June at the American Library Association annual conference in Philadelphia.

The work will intensify throughout the fall and culminate at a meeting in January 2026 when the 15 of us will be sequestered in a hotel in Chicago examining, re-examining and talking about the eligible titles until we reach a consensus. Until then, our lips are sealed, and we are only allowed to discuss eligible titles with each other (and then only when all of us are present; no side conversations allowed). If it sounds a little like a courtroom jury, that's because it is!

In the end, I will rejoice in the hard and meaningful work, have fond memories, new friends, and few more favorite books. I also see a very large donation of gorgeous, brand new picture books coming for the Friends' Bookstore in early 2026! I love to talk about this process and picture books. Feel free to ask me any questions when you see me around the branch.

The Friends of the Castro Valley Library depend on your generous donations of books, CDs, and DVDs. We are happy to receive your donations any time the BookStore is open. If your donation is more than a few bags or cartons, we will appreciate your contacting us ahead of time to make sure we have

staff available to receive it. We are happy to lend you a cart or help you bring your donation inside. Bring your donations directly to the BookStore office door. Please do not leave donations elsewhere in – or outside the Library.

Please note that we may not accept donations the 2 weeks prior to a big book sale due to time and space constraints. If at all possible, save your donation until the weeks after the sale. (Thank you!!)

At this time, we are accepting donations of most types of books, DVDs, and music CDs as well as magazines that are no more than 4 months old. We may also accept jigsaw puzzles, board games, unused greeting cards, and stationery items. We do not accept sets of encyclopedias or similar books, condensed books, older textbooks, or books that are dirty, moldy, smoky, or otherwise damaged. We also cannot accept VHS or cassette tapes (music or audiobooks) or vinyl records. A good rule of thumb on condition: if you would purchase the item yourself, we will most likely accept it. Please feel free to call us if you have questions about acceptance of specific items.

Your donation is tax-deductible. We are happy to give you a receipt for your donation. The receipt will specify the number of cartons or bags of books or other items received (so you don't have to stand there and wait for them to be counted.)

Funds received from the sale of these items pay for many library programs and amenities that would not otherwise be available.



Isola by Allegra Goodman (2025 fiction): This story of Marguerite de la Rocque de Roberval is based on that of a



real person who lived in France in the 16th century. Born to privilege, she was orphaned at an early age, and her wealth and inherited lands placed under the control of a guardian Her guardian strips the estate of its wealth in order to finance voyages to the New World, so that Marguerite becomes impoverished and under his control. When Marguerite is about 20, he determines to take

her and her nurse Damienne to the New World in a voyage similar to that of Cartier, to the eastern edge of Canada. On the voyage, Margurite becomes involved with her guardian's secretary, Auguste, incurring her guardian's anger. As punishment, he maroons Marguerite, Damienne, and Auguste on a small unnamed island known on maps simply as "Isola." With little food and only the clothing and items in the trunks they brought with them, the three carve out an existence on the small island. During the warmer months, they are able to hunt and fish, but the winters are extreme and survival is difficult. Auguste becomes ill and dies, with the two women forced to live on their own. Later, Damienne also perishes, leaving Marguerite alone. This is a story of spirit and faith, of a courageous woman who survives against all odds. It makes fascinating reading and perhaps a desire to know more about her. (Ginger Russell)

Legendborn by Tracy Deonn (2020 YA Fantasy): Legendborn is about a 16-year-old girl named Bree who decides to go to UNC-Chapel Hill's Early College Program with her best friend Alice. When the story begins, Bree's mother has just passed away in a car crash, but Bree doesn't think it was an accident. Bree and Alice start the school year




with a beach party at night with all of their new classmates. This party is where she first realizes that something is seriously off, and witnesses magic with her own eyes. Later, when she starts classes, she finds a hidden organization based on King Arthur and his Round Table. She finds that this organization can do magic, and so she joins, suspecting that

this organization knows something about her mother's death. So the story is about her learning about this organization and finding her own magic. This story was a lot of fun to read, and I liked it a lot. The story line was very interesting and the different plot twists were very surprising and fun. The first book is a little over 500 pages, and there are two more books in the series so far. It is a very interesting series, and if you like YA fantasy, I recommend reading this book. (Evan Marsh)

Last Twilight in Paris by Pam Jenoff (2025 fiction): It is 1953, and Louise finds a necklace in a box of donations for the thrift store where she works part-time. It is mostly unre-

markable, half a heart on a chain, but she feels certain she has seen it before, in Germany, at a POW camp. The necklace is certainly one that a prisoner gave to her friend Franny when they both worked for the Red Cross during the war. But Franny was killed, and her death written off as a tragic accident. Louise is not so sure. Travel back in time with Louise to find out.



Meanwhile, in 1938, a young Jewish woman, Helaine, meets the love of her life and marries him against her parents' wishes. He is an accomplished cellist with the symphony orchestra. They live an idyllic, if frugal, life until 1941 when he is fired from the orchestra and subsequently disappears, leaving her with her half of a heart necklace. In 1942, Helaine is arrested and imprisoned in a little-known camp located inside the Levitan department store, where the prisoners sort and display fine furniture and home goods that were taken from the homes of deported Jews and made available for purchase by the Nazi elite. She manages to hide her necklace in a crack in the wall. This is a fastmoving mystery, complete with plot twists and an unexpected conclusion. Pam Jenoff is the author of 9 previous novels, many of which are set during World War II. She was formerly a diplomat handling Holocaust issues and now teaches law in Philadelphia. (Ginger Russell)

How to Solve Your Own Murder by Kristen Perrin (2024 fiction). This is a perfect summer read for someone who enjoys mysteries set in quaint English villages. In 1965, three sixteen-year-old girl friends went to an English county fair and decided to have their fortunes told. And with the fortune told to Frances Adams, her life changes forever. She is told that her future "contains dry bones" because she will be murdered. This haunts her for the rest of her life as she questions the actions of people around her and becomes known as eccentric and difficult. In present day, her great niece who has never met Frances is summoned to Castle Knoll to "discuss the responsibilities that will come with being the sole benefactor of her estate and assets." When Annie Adams arrives at Castle Knoll, Frances is found dead. Annie is determined to discover who committed this crime and thus, the story continues. Will Annie solve the crime or will she inherit her aunt's fate instead of her fortune? This is a fast read. Enjoy! (Robin Olivier)
